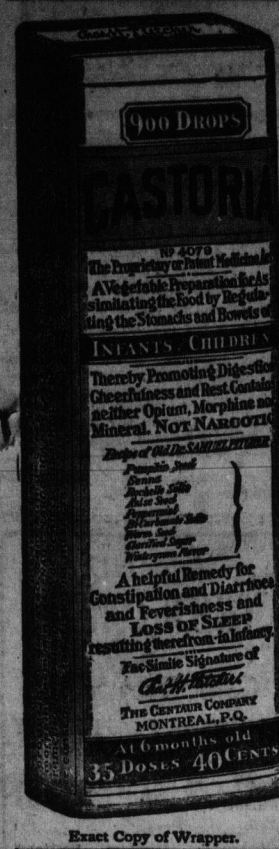

Fifty Million Dollar  
Firm Is Proposed

Scotland's "Dry" Vote Cost  
About 30,000 Pounds Ster-

London, May 4.—A project is afoot for the Australian manufacture of textile machinery and arrangements have been made in co-operation with British engineering firms, representing a capital of ten millions sterling who can cover the whole range of production of a textile plant. It is estimated that the manufacture will cost five per cent less than in England.

## Scotland's Dry Vote.

It is officially stated that the recent

limitations; 40 for no license; 508,727  
people voted for no change and 452,  
378 for no license.

treal nine days ago with \$1.25 between  
them. They arrived here entirely  
broke.

## Toronto's Jobless

Toronto, May 4.—Civil authorities  
estimate that there are at the very  
least 20,000 men out of employment  
in Toronto. Each day finds new men  
registering at the Ontario Govern-  
ment Employment Bureau, with little  
hope of work being found for  
them. Yesterday positions were  
found for thirty the highest number  
for some time.

LABOR DISPUTES  
COST FIGURES

Claims Builders Are Wrong  
in Making Eighty Per Cent  
the Estimate.

Ottawa, May 4.—Inductive costs of  
labor and materials in building were  
again before the conference of labor  
and contractors in the building trade  
of Canada today. Labor delegates ob-  
jected to the figures put forward by  
J. B. Carwell of Hamilton, yesterday  
and Tom Moore, leader of the labor  
delegates, quoted statistics to improve  
the figures. Mr. Carwell's figures, he  
protested, that the costs in build-  
ing were divided as follows:

## New Divided.

"Direct labor costs on the contract,  
35 per cent; materials delivered on the  
contract, 55 per cent; contractors' overhead and profit, 10 per cent."  
The committee on conditions of em-  
ployment recommended closer co-  
operation between federal and provincial  
agencies for the direction of labor  
to points where it was needed; aboli-  
tion of private employment agencies;  
and reduced transportation of govern-  
ment railways to carry unemployed labor  
to points where a demand for it  
existed. In regard to industrial safety  
the committee recommended that suit-  
able legislation be passed in all pro-  
vinces and that the operation of this  
legislation be under provincial work-  
men's compensation boards.

## Joint Industries.

A recommendation in favor of the  
extension of the principle of joint in-  
dustrial councils provoked a lengthy  
discussion and was generally support-  
ed.

The committee was asked to draw  
up a pamphlet constitution for these  
boards to operate under.

The conference which adjourned for  
committee work at five o'clock this  
evening meets again tomorrow after-  
noon at 2 o'clock and it is expected  
that the sessions will be terminated  
tomorrow evening.

bie, of Chatham, assisted the groom.  
After the ceremony the bride party  
repaired to the home of the bride's  
parents, where a reception was held,  
at which were present a large num-  
ber of relatives and friends. The  
house was tastefully decorated for the  
occasion with ferns, lilies-of-the-valley  
and other plants. A very faint

Continue Pensions  
On Same Basis

Ottawa, Ont., May 4.—Recommend-  
ations in regard to the pension act  
were considered by the House Pen-  
sions Committee in private session  
this morning. The committee decid-  
ed, it is understood, in favor of con-  
tinuing pensions on the present basis  
for another year.

W. P. Nickle, ex-M.P., representing  
the Canadian Patriotic Fund, furnis-  
hed the committee with evidence of  
cases in which relief had been given  
by the fund.

Fines For April  
In Police Court

Over \$1,200 Collected—Fines  
Struck in Opium Cases  
\$1,800.

The fines collected in the police  
court during the month of April total-  
led something over \$1,200. Consider-  
able of the amount was for violation  
of the liquor law, and will go to the  
provincial treasury. Fines for the  
unlawful possession of opium amount-  
ed to \$1,800, but only \$900 of it was  
collected. One of the four Chi-  
nese, Hum Sek, who was fined for  
this offence, was fined \$1,000 for  
selling opium without a license and \$200  
for having it in his possession. He  
was unable to raise either amount and  
will therefore have to spend a year  
and six months in jail.

## Chinese Story

Two of the Chinese fined in this  
connection have a very sorry opin-  
ion of British justice. They are the  
former proprietor and chef of the  
King Cafe on Prince William street,  
Hum Fung Tung and Hum Wung.

Hum Fung Tung says he bought  
over the cafe from Hum Jim when the  
latter went back to China, and ac-  
cording to Tung's story, Hum Jim  
asked him to take care of a few things  
for him which he had left in a trunk.  
He consented, and left the trunk un-  
touched, awaiting word from Hum  
Jim as to its disposal. In the mean-  
time the cafe was raided, and the de-  
tectives discovered an opium pipe and  
lamp and a small box full of opium  
ashes in the trunk, and as Tung says  
with much disgust, "Me fine \$300 for  
Hum Jim's ashes." Such is the re-  
ward the Occident holds forth to the  
good Samaritan from the Orient.

## Act of Kindness

Hum Fung Tung claims he was taxed two  
hundred beans for an act of kindness,  
too. While both the King Cafe Chi-  
nese claim they never touch the drug  
themselves, they admit that Hum Sek,  
the Brussels street laundryman, was  
an addict. Hum Wung is Hum Sek's  
cousin, and when Hum Sek was im-  
prisoned and deprived of the drug,  
which he had come to crave for more  
than anything else in the world, his  
fellow Chinamen feared the old man  
would die if it was not supplied. He  
lately cut off from the drug, so Hum  
Wung consented to take some "pills"  
to Hum Sek that another Chinaman  
had cooked. He went up at tea to  
the gaol, but as it was not the hour  
for visitors, was refused admittance.  
He returned to the cafe and was there  
when it was raided; and as the de-  
tectives found the paper of opium  
pills in his possession he, too, for his  
kindness to his fellow countryman,  
was fined the \$200 demanded by the  
law.

## TWO CENTS INCOME TAX.

Belleville, Ont., May 4.—The small-  
est assessment for the Dominion in-  
come tax received here was two cen-  
ts. The sender forwarded a five  
cent piece to cover his estimated tax.

## BUY JAP HOLDINGS.

Vancouver, B. C., May 4.—The claims  
staked by Wada, the Jap, in the Port  
Norman oil fields have been acquired  
by a Vancouver syndicate and a Do-  
minion charter has been granted to the  
Jap. K. Cornwall Syndicate Ltd.,  
for the prospecting and development  
of petroleum, gas, and mineral de-  
posits.

Col. Cornwall, a director of the com-  
pany, will be the field manager, and  
it is the intention to begin active de-  
velopment in the near future. The  
company starts out with \$50,000 cap-  
italization as its minimum. The char-  
ter provides that the shares have no  
nominal or par value but that the  
amount of capital stock must be sub-  
scribed. Vancouver will be the head  
office of the syndicate, with Colonel  
Cornwall looking after its interests in  
the local field.
