

at a concert given here by "Bruiteura," has set Paris by the ears. Instruments invented by two Italians
were used.

Before the concert began, Sanfor
Marinetti made a speech and asked
the audience "to listen with serenity
and manifest their sentiments at the
end of each piece." This, was, in
every respect a fair request, had
the circumstances been normal.

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Asked Too Much.

But apparently it was beyond but man capacity to listen with serenity to any such concert, and long before the first piece was half over, the whole audience rippied and rocked with merriment, until at last serenity went to the winds and the noise of the futurist orchestra was almost drowned in whisting and laughter.
