

BETTER TERMS RESOLUTION CARRIED LOCAL LEGISLATURE.

Premier Tweedle Closed the Debate in a Masterly Speech—The Whole Nine of the Opposition Voted Against the Motion—House Adjourned.

Fredrickton, N. B., April 9.—The bills agreed to yesterday in committee were read a third time and passed.
