Rut the women persisted in being frightened in spite of all efforts to reassure her and hurried whatever food she had on the table. "But," said the Lieutenant, "when she saw this company stand about the table with bared heads, and a tail gaunt man raised his hand and invoke God's blessing on the bounteous spread before them, the poor woman broke down with a fit of sobbing and crying. She had no longer any fears, but bid them wait, and in a few moments had made them hot coffee, in abundance. She then emptied their canteens of the muddy water they contained and filled them with coffee. Her astonishment increased when they insisted upon paying her. The Lieutenant tells this with great expression —Said she, "Their asking a blessing took me by surprise, and when I saw this I felt that our country was safe with such men to fight for it."
