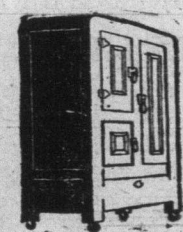

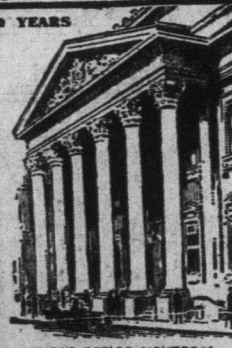

CHIPPEWA CANAL MEN HYDRO OFFICIALS DISCUSS TERMS

PROSPECT OF SETTLEMENT BRIGHTER

(Special to The Record)

TORONTO, May 26.—Prospects of a settlement of the dispute between the Hydro Power Commission of Ontario and their employees in the Niagara district trades federation, which would avert a stoppage of the whole Hydro-Electric service in the Niagara system, involving 134 municipalities, are brighter to-day than they have been for over a week, though the danger of a strike greater in extent than a general one in Toronto, is by no means avoided.

At a four-hour conference in the offices of the Provincial Commission last night, held by Sir Adam Beck, Chief Engineer Gaby and H. Acres representing the commission, and Frank H. Heley, president, J. Flett, of the A. F. of L., J. Hunter, of the Painters and E. Ingles, representing the men, the Commission offered to recognise the eight-hour day principle, to meet the needs of the workers on the Chippewa Canal development, but to continue the ten-hour shift, paying the men overtime at the regular rate plus ten cents an hour.

The men are urging that they receive time and a half for overtime as a basis, leaving the wage schedule and other matters in dispute to an independent arbitration. The men propose to take Mr. Moore as their representative, the Commission appointing one member and the two to appoint a chairman.

The federation's representatives believe that if the Commission will offer time and a half for overtime and arbitration for the other matters in dispute, the men would at their meeting at Niagara Falls to-night decide to remain at work. Failing these basic terms, they are doubtful if the mass meeting would accept time plus ten cents an hour for overtime as an amicable settlement.

"Sir Adam Beck desires to address the men at the meeting to-night," said Frank H. Heley when interviewed to-day. "But he is opposed to our addressing the meeting or representatives of the involved Hydro Municipalities this afternoon. Mr. Flett is that if the Hydro Commi-
