and will require new planting. What they call fall planting here, begins in October, and two or three hundred acres is generally planted about that time on all sugar farms. The planting then ceases till after the grinding or sugar making season is over, but the necessary amount of seed cane is laid by in what is called mats, which are piles of cane laid all one way, and so placed as to make the leaves which are left on them form a covering which agenerally keeps out the frost and preserves them in good condition till they are wanted for planting in February. The severe cold of last winter entirely destroyed over one half of the cane so laid away, and rendered the greater part of it useless for seed. This in itself was a great misfortune to the sugar planters, but it did not end there. Unfortunately, most of the fall planted cane was covered very lightly with earth, consequently, a large part of it, too, was frozen. The yield of sugar this season here will depend mostly on the stubble cane, but that also has in many places been serious by injured.

Since the cultivation of the sugar beet and the manufacture of sugar therefrom has attained such humense proportions in Germany and France, many of the planters here have had all they could do to keep their heads above water and compete with imported sugars, and now that this last calamity of last winter-frost has fallen upon them, the result may be very disastrous to the sugar industry here.
