BAKEP, Hon. GEORGE BERNARD, M.A., Q.C. (Missisquoi.)

Third s, of the late William Baker, Esq., who represented Missisquoi in the L.C. Assembly from 1834 until the suspension of the constitution of that Province in 1837; and nephew of Stevens Baker, Esq., who represented the county in the same body from 1830 to 1834; grandfather was a U. E. Loyalist. B. at Dunham, P.Q., 29 Jan. 1834. Ed. at the Univ. of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, where he graduated, 1855. M., 1860, Jane Percival, eldest dau. of Peter Cowan, Esq., of Cowansville, Sheriff of the District of Bedford. Called to the Bar, L.C., same year. Created a Q.C. 1876. Is a Trustee of the Univ. of Bishop's College. Apptd. a mem. of Ex. Council and Sol. Genl., 27 Jan. 1876. Sat for Missisquoi in the House of Commons from June, 1870, until g.e. 1874, when he retired. Elected to Quebec Legislative Assembly by acclamation at g. e. 1875, and again on his appointment to office. Re-elected to Commons at last g.e. A Liberal Conservative.—Sweetsburg, P. Q.

BANNERMAN, WILLIAM. (South Remfrew.)

S. of Thomas Bannerman, whose ancestors have long been residents of Sutherlandshire, Scot. B. in the parish of Kildonan, Sutherlandshire, Scot., 5 Nov. 1841. Ed. in Helmsdale. Came to Can. in the year 1857. M., in 1867, at Eganville, to Isabella Campbell, dau. of Peter D. Campbell, Esq. Has taken a prominent part in municipal and political affairs. First returned to Parliament at last g.e. A Conservative.—Greenlaw, Renfrew, Ont.

BARNARD, FRANCIS JONES. (Yale.)

Descended from a U. E. Loyalist family, who originally came from England, and settled in Massachusetts. S. of the late Isaac Bernard, of Quebec, P.Q. B. in the City of Quebec. Ed. there. M., 6 July 1853, Ellen, youngest dau. of Richard Stillman, formerly of Quebec. Was a mem. of the L.C. of British Columbia, for the District of Yale, from 1866 to the date of Union, 1871. First returned to present seat on appointment of sitting member as Indian Commr. A Conservative,—Victoria, B.C.
