

Ottawa, September 3, 1920.

Dear Mrs. Galbraith,

This letter is just to let you know that I have not forgotten to write Mr. Kelly, the President of the Grand Trunk Railway with respect to a further consideration of Mr. Galbraith's claim to a pension.

I cannot, of course, say what Mr. Kelly may find it possible to do, but I have written him just as strongly as I can, and urged him on personal grounds, as well as for business reasons to endeavour to have every consideration given Mr. Galbraith's claim.

I am leaving for the West in a few days. Maybe that I shall not hear from Mr. Kelly before that time. However, should a reply come within a day or two, I shall be only too glad to acquaint you with its contents.

I asked my secretary to send a copy of my speech on the Grand Trunk to Mr. Galbraith. I think this has already gone forward, and I hope it has been duly received.

I was very sorry to see the extent to which Mr. Galbraith's health has been impaired. I do hope that it may improve with time, and that, meanwhile, some adjustment of the pension claim may be made to the satisfaction of all.
