Third Witness: - 1-27963 Sgt. Humphreys, O.B. Senior Headquarters Canadian Counter Intelligence, sworn, states:-

I am Sgt. Humphreys, O.B. and at approximately 1600 hrs on 26 Sep 48, I started drinking in my tailor shop at approximately 1700 hrs a suggestion was made by Pt. Ladouceur that we go to Rotterdam for the night. Pt. Ladouceur wanted to obtain a gig and we departed for Rotterdam at approximately 1900 hrs, accompanied by Sgt. Fitzgerald and 2 girls. The gig was driven by Pt. Ladouceur who drove it around the back of the barrack block thus avoiding the pigout that was stationed opposite the O.B. Staff-building to control anti-going and incoming vehicles. I, myself, do not recollect arriving in Rotterdam due to my drunken condition. He visited friends in Rotterdam after which Sgt. Fitzgerald and I accompanied by the 2 girls started back for O.B. Canadian Counter Intelligence, Eltreet, at which place we arrived at approximately 2315 hrs. Pt. Ladouceur stayed in Rotterdam. I cannot recall taking the girls home as I "passed out" on the way home. On arrival at the barracks, Sgt. Fitzgerald wakened me and we left the girls behind. He then took me to my quarters and from there to the mess hall for something to eat where I met Sgt. Fitzgerald again.

Cross examined by counsel

- Q. Were you too drunk to drive home from Rotterdam?  
 A. Yes, I do not remember leaving Rotterdam.
