

#### LORD ST. HELIERS' LIFE

PRESIDENT OF THREE DIVISIONS OF BRITISH HISH COURT.

Eminent British Jurist Recently Deceased Was Better Known As Sir Francis Jeune-Became Peer This Year-Was Considered An Ideal Judge in the British Divorce Court -Kindly and Dispassionate.

Lord St. Hellers (who, as Sir Francis Jeune, was president of the Probate, Divorce and Admiralty Division of the High Court from 1891 till Januof the High Court from 1891 till January 30 of this year, when he resigned and was elevated to the peerage) died on the 9th April in London.

Lord St. Hellers, who for many years as Mr. Justice Jeune presided over the London Divorce Court, only retired from his office in February and



LORD ST. HELIERS. was no more than sixty-two years of age. On his resignation he was raised to the peerage, taking his title from the town in Jersey, the Channel Island, to a leading family of which he belonged.

elonged. His father was the late Rev. F. His father was the late Rev. F. Jeune, Bishop of Peterborough, and the future judge was educated at Harrow and Balliol College, Oxford, gaining brilliant distinction. He was called to the Bar at the Inner Temple when twenty-five—he was born in 1843—and was twenty years engaged in active pleading before he took silk as Queen's counsel. Three years later he was appointed a Judge of the High Court and in 1891 appointed president of the Probate, Divorce and Admiralty Division, which post he occupied for thirteen years. He made an admirafor thirteen years. He made an admirable judge in this difficult office, almost every "cause celebre" in matrimonial litigation coming before him, while his private advice solicited in many cases led to the settlement or handownest of preceding without proceedings without the settlement or handownest of precedings without proceedings without pr

while his private acroice solicited in many cases led to the settlement or abandonment of proceedings without the sordid details coming into the glare of publicity.

Sir Francis Jenne is survived by his wife, Lady Jenne, who is equally well known in English society. To the sudden loss of their only son,, a young officer in the British army, stricken with typhoid in India last year is attributed the illness which cause Sir Francis to give in a premature resignation from the bench. Lady Jenne was the widow of Captain Stanley, brother of the present Lord Stanley of Alderley, and one of her daughters by her first marriage is married to Mr. St. John Brodrick, the present Secretary for India. Mrs. Stanley's receptions brought together all the notable people in London society and when she became Lady Jenne her salon became a favorite meeting place for those prominent in literature, art, politics and the stage.

Dismal Swamp No More.

The famous Dismal swamp in Virginia is coming into profitable cultivation. The first company to promote Dismal swamp was erganized in colonial days. George Washington was one of the premoters and the largest stockholder. His company qwared two thirds of the 290,000 acres of the swamp and built a canal to ficat the timber frem its property.

Little has been done from that time until recently, except by lumbermen. In the days before the war the swamp was a popular refuge for runaway slaves. It is situated in the southeastern corner of Virginia, and it extends from a few miles frers Norfolk. At its highest points it is only fifteen or twenty feet above tidewater. Its streams are so pure that their water is sought by vessels going on long voyages.

It was long thought that the swamp was malarious and that the swamp could not live there the year round. This notion has been disproved by the truck farmers seeking cheaper land, who are clearing up the swamp and turning it into prosperous truck gar-dens.

Cleth Made From Wood.

In Germany, Spain and Holland textile goods are made out of wood, and it is probable that this industry will soon spread to France. The process consists in making the wood pulp pass directly through a metallic plate with a number of silts, resulting in the formation of this ribbons, which passfrom the silited plate directly to a machine which twists them, transforming them into very regular threads of any desired size. The wood fiber threads thus produced go by the names of xyloline, silvaline and licella. They are classified by number like the other threads in use. Mized with hemp threads they have been used to make towels. These mixed fabrics readily admit of washing dyeing and printing. The wood pulp thread, which grews weak when wet, regains its resistence when dried.

PRIVATE BILLS.

Cost of Putting Them Through the Leg-Islative Assembly-Great Variation in the Amount.

Brivate bills constitute the great bulk of the work of any ordinary session of the Legislature. They are in many ways the most important pleces of legislation passed by our Provincial Parliament and emphasize in an especial way that body's sovereignty. The most valuable of the natural resources of the Province are in this way disposed of and the most important of rights and privileges are bestowed on the different companies making appli-

cation.

Does a municipality want special powers which it has not under the general Municipal Act, it applies to the Legislature and the application takes the form of a private bill. Has a municipality passed a bylaw granting a bonus to some manufacturing concern, it seeks confirmation from the Legislature in a private bill.

Companies Are Prolific. Another impertant class of private bills is the railway bills. A railway, whether steam or electrid, wants a charter and it comes to the Legislature. It wants extension of a charter already granted, and another private bill, is necessory. These companies of all kinds which want powers which they do not have under the general Companies Act obtain them by means of a private bill.

There are ecclesiastical private bills, which grant religious congregations relief in special circumstances such as when they want to sell a cemetery and to remove the bodies interred therein. Another subdivision of this same class are bills incorporating religious sects. Many bills also relate to individuals, to enable them to practice some profession, to change a man's name, to enable him to dispose of an estate received under special conditions, or to make arrangements affecting a marriage settlement.

This is certainly the case in private bill promotion, but even where the bill passes pro forma a solicitor's advice is usually necessary. A solicitor's advice can sometimes be dispensed with, but usually a solicitor has some part. Steps To Be Taken.

Steps To Be Taken.

These are the steps to be followed in promoting a private bill. First an application stating in general terms what the bill is for must be published in the Ontario Gazette for six weeks and for a similar length of time in a local paper in every County or other municipality affected. The fee for the insertion in the Ontario Gazette is \$8, and the cost of advertisement in local papers differs with the papers. The solicitor's fee varies with the solicitor collector's fee varies with the solicitor and the bill.

and the bill.

The next step is to send two petitions —one to His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor and the other to the Legislative Assembly. The former asks His Honor to assent to the bill and the latter asks the Legislature to pass it. The petition must contain a full statement of all the special circumstances which give rise to the need of special legislation, which must be followed by a prayer stating concisely what is wanted in the way of legislation. Usually the petition is drawn up by a solicitor.

The petition and the draft of the bill, together with the fee of \$100, is sent in to the Clerk of Legislature within two weeks of the publication of the first notice in The Gazette. The petition is formally presented in the House and two days later it is read and received and with a statutory declaration that all the regulations in regard to the publication of notices have been observed, it is sent to the Standing Orders Committee of the House. This committee sees that all the regulations have been observed and that the preamble of the bill agrees with the petition.

when the bill passes this committee, the member who is in charge of it introduces it in the House where it receives its first reading. It is then referred as a matter of course to either the Private Bills or Rallway Committee.

Some Fees Refunded.

The first step before these committees is the proving of the preamble. If the circumstances described in preamble are such as, in the opinion of the committee, demand special legislation, the bill stands. If not, the bill is usually withdrawn and the \$100, less the actual cost of printing the bill, refunded. In the case of charitable bills, that is, bills dealing with churches and religious and charitable organizations, a motion is generally passed to the effect that the fee, less the cost of printing, be refunded. In case of railway bills, maps, and other particulars of the proposed mite have also to be filed with the clerk of the committee. In the case of estate bills, that is, bills altering trusts held under wills, they are sent to the Estate Bill Committee, consisting of two judges at Osgoode Hall, for consideration.

When the preamble and sections of the bill have been passed, it is reported to the House, and if it has been amended the House orders that it be reprinted. Then it is read a second time, and referred to a Committee of the whole House. Here it may be a ain amended, but if a member intends to move any substantial amendment he has to give two days' notice. When the bill comes up for the third reading, it is still open for amendment by a member who has given two days' notice.
