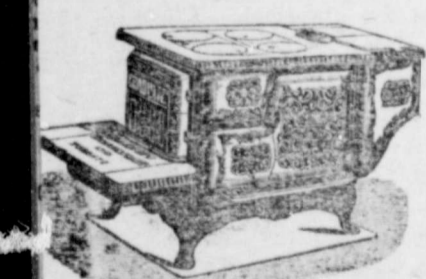

EDITORIAL NOTES.

The 34th Battalion received a grant of \$200 from the County Council at its last session to assist the regiment in buying helmets and colors. The Council displayed their usual generosity in this matter.

The Soo canal will likely be the next source of investigation and scandal. Already extras to nearly a million of dollars have been wasted and the end is not yet. Another Esquimault graving dock case. This is one of the little trifles our brother of the *Whitby Chronicle* thinks too small for consideration.

Once more the Manitoba School Question is before the people of the Dominion, the Manitoba Legislature having refused to accept the request of the Dominion Government. The government of Manitoba has sent out a very dignified refusal, accompanied by its reasons for non-compliance.

After all the 34th Battalion have gone into camp at Whitby. There appears to have been considerable maneuvering about the affairs of locating the camping place. Beaverton, Niagara, Cunningham and Oshawa and Whitby having all been advocated. In the case of Cunningham \$200 was offered for the distinguished company, but apparently Whitby went one better.

The County of Ontario is now under the Torrens' Titles system, and those who desire to avail themselves of the benefit of the act may do so with but little cost. His Honor Judge Darnell has been recommended as the first Master of Titles. To Reeve Treleven, of Beaverton is due the credit of this very desirable measure, and his persistency has had its reward.

The County of Ontario now rejoices in a coat-of-arms—also a brand new crest and motto—which latter reads "Peace, Plenty, Progress"—the three P's. The county arms are described as follows: A shield quartered thus—(1) a pine tree, (2) a horn of plenty, (3) a sheaf of corn (4) a steamboat. Badge—County of Ontario. Supporters—two maple wreaths. The crest—a stag. If only a few wee-be-gone paupers holding up the horns of plenty with their hands in the distance could have been worked into the device the thing would be complete. As it is it lacks realism.

The Bill to prevent members of the House of Commons from accepting passes from Railway companies, and another to prevent members of the House from receiving government appointments until a year after they have ceased being members did not pass. Both were voted down by large majorities as was expected. Both bills are right, however, and in the interests of the people, and their rejection goes more clearly to prove how thorough a regeneration of political life is receiving in the Dominion. Mr. Madill of North Ontario voted against both measures.

We are not desirous of getting rid of Thorah, Mara, Rama, and Beaverton as portions of this county, but we can hardly see what advantage it can be to them to retain connection with it. The town of Orillia offers a most suitable location for the county town of a new county, and is really the centre of a number of municipalities which only figure as the tail-end of counties, stuck on because they were loose and had no abiding place. These half-castaway people look away across the beautiful waters of Simcoe and, hunching and behold the beautiful Orillia on the hills beyond, a veritable promised land teeming in beauty, which they may see but cannot enter. Orillia has often courted the cooperation of the many surrounding municipalities in establishing a county seat there, where their title deeds, courts of justice, county legislative halls, etc., could be located; but the wooing is slow. We do not doubt that each of the adjoining municipalities would be as much advantaged as Orillia by the formation of a new county, for the scheme would bring innumerable conveniences to all; but men and municipalities are slow and conservative, and seem to prefer old associations and disabilities rather than undergo changes. —*Chronicle*. The generous impulses of the *Chronicle* will be appreciated by the people of Thorah, Mara, Rama and Beaverton as well as the effort to settle our destiny. As it is we have other ideas in this connection which the fulness of time will no doubt develop.

arrived in a few minutes, the poor little fellow was unconscious, and though all that medical aid could do was done for the sufferer, he lived only a short time. Douglas was a bright, healthy and winsome child of a little over six years, and was a general favorite. The bereaved family have the deepest sympathy of the entire community in their sad hour of trial. —*Gazette*.
