Mr. Kormann was an enthusiastic politi-cian, and it has been truly said of him that no single individual in the ranks of the Reform party enjoyed a larger amount of personal influence in political contests. In electors, Mr. Kormann's influence was an acknowledged power, and he owed this in great part to his generous devotion to the interests of his countrymen, hundreds of whom he had been the means of inducing to come to Canada, and to all of whom he was hand.
