### ARE PRISONERS

Viscount and Lord Are Taken in by the Germans.

[By Special Wire to the Courier]  
LONDON, Nov. 7.—Announcement is made that Viscount Henry William Crichton, eldest son of the Earl of Erne and major of the Royal Horse Guards, and Lord Hugh Grosvenor, brother of the Duke of Westminster, are prisoners in the hands of the Germans. The men are brothers-in-law, Viscount Crichton having married the sister of Lord Hugh Grosvenor, while the latter married the sister of the viscount.

Another statement issued here says that Captain Robert Bruce, heir to Lord Balfour of Burleigh, has been killed in action, and that Lord Francis Scott, the son of the late Duke of Buccleuch, has been severely wounded.

Lord Reginald Ardee, eldest son of the Earl of Meath, is among the wounded in a hospital at Boulogne. Richard Windham-Quinn, son of the heir to the earldom of Dunraven, is in a hospital at Weymouth, suffering from wounds received in action, while the Hon. Charles Douglas-Pennant, son of Baron Penrhyn, is wounded and a prisoner.

### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH LAND NEGOTIATIONS

THIS sole best of a family, or any over 18 years old, may homestead quarter section of available Dominion in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the main Lands Agency or Sub-Agency District. Entry by proxy may be at any Dominion Lands Agency (Sub-Agency on certain conditions). Fee—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each year. A homesteader may live five miles from his homestead on a farm of 80 acres, on certain conditions. Residence is performed in the vicinity of the homestead. In certain districts a homesteader may stand by pre-empt a quarter, along-side his homestead. Price \$3.00 acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each year after earning homestead. Also 20 acres extra cultivation. Emption patent may be obtained as a homestead patent on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his stand right may take a purchased stand in certain districts. Price \$3.00 acre. Duties—must reside six months each of three years, cultivate 50 acres a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to certain conditions. Live stock may be substituted under certain conditions.
