WORRYING OVER

British People Not Satisfied as to General Townshend's Safety.

This is due to the rule that drivers when not carrying passengers must pay for their own gasoline. The real trouble is traced to the enistment of competent drivers. Bepanies have temporarily retired from business. Scotland Yard has hindered the sustibution of new drivers by a the sustibution of new drivers by a refusal to relax on the strict geographical examination of former days.
