## EVERYDAY HEROISM.

A Sermon on Common Duties and Rewards.

### SICKNESS A TEST OF CHARACTER

Dr. Ta-mage Gives Words of Encouragement to a Soldier to Those Who Told and Struggle—Heroes of Sickness and Domestic Justice.

Washington, June 8.—Dr. Ta-mage, who is now preaching to large audiences in the great cities of England and Scotland, sends this discourse, in which he shows that many who in this world pass as of little importance will in the day of final retribution be crowned with high honor; text, II Timothy ii, 3, "Thou therefore endure hardness, as a good soldier of Jesus Christ." We have the full length portraits of the Cromwells, the Washingtons, the Napoleons and the Wellingtons of the world. History is not written in black ink, but red ink of human blood. The gods of human ambition do not drink from bowls made out of silver or gold or precious stones, but out of the bleached skulls of the fallen. But I am not to enroll before you a scroll of heroes that the world has never acknowledged—those who faced no guns, blew no bugle blast, conquered no cities, chained no captives to their chariot wheels, and yet in the great day of eternity will stand higher than some of those whose names startled the nations, and seraph and rapt spirit and archangel will tell their deeds to a listening universe. I mean the heroes of common, everyday life.

In this roll, in the first place, I find all the heroes of the sick room. When Satan had failed to overcome Job, he said to God, "Put forth thy hand and touch him with the sore, yet he will curse thee, yet he will not." Satan, had found out that which we have all found out, that sickness is the greatest test of one's character. A man who can stand that, can stand anything. To be shut in a room as fast as though it were a battle, to be so nervous you cannot endure the tap of a child's foot; to have luscious fruit, which tempts the appetite of the robust and healthy, excite our longing and disgust when it first appears on the platter; to have the rapier of pain strike through the side or across the temples like a razor or to put the foot into a vice or throw the body into a bath of fever, yet yet have been men and women, but more women than men, who have cheerfully endured this hardness. Through years of exhausting rheumatism and excruciating neuralgia they have endured, and through bodily distress that rasped the nerves and tore the muscles and paled the cheeks and stooped the shoulders. By the dim light of the sick room taper they saw on their wall the picture of that land where the inhabitants are never sick. Through the dead silence of the night they heard the chorus of the angels.

The cancer ate away his face from week to week and day to day, and she became weaker and weaker, and every "good-night" was feebler than the "good-night" before, yet never said. The children looked up into her face and saw suffering transformed into a heavenly smile. They who suffered on the battlefield and shot and shell were not more heroes and heroines than those who, in the field hospital and in the asylum, had fevers which no ice could cool and no surgery cure. No shout of a command cheer from the numbers and aching and homesickness—yet willing to suffer, confident in God, hopeful of heaven. Heroes of rheumatism. Heroes of neuralgia. Heroes of sick headache. Heroes of life long invalidism. Heroes and heroines. They shall reign forever and ever. Hark! I catch just one note of the eternal anthem, "There shall be no more pain!" Bless God for that!

In this roll I also find the heroes of toil and their work uncomplainingly. It is comparatively easy to lead a regiment into battle when you know that the whole nation will applaud the victory; it is comparatively easy to doctor the sick when you know that your skill will be appreciated by a large company of friends and relatives; it is comparatively easy to address an audience when in the glowing eyes and the flushed cheeks you know that your words are adopted. But to do sewing when you expect the employer will come and thrust his thumb through the work to show how imperfect it is or to have the whole garment thrown back on you, to be alone over a needle and thread and know there will be no one to say you did it well, but only a swearing employer howling across the scaffold, to work until your eyes are dim and your back aches and your heart faints, and to know that if you stop before night your children will starve—ah, the sword has not slain so many as the needle. The great battlefields of our civil war were not Gettysburg and Shiloh and South Mountain. The great battlefields were in the arsenals and in the shops and in the attics, where women made army jackets for a sixpence. They toiled on until they died. They had no funeral eulogium, but in the name of my God, this day, I enroll their names among those of whom the world was not worthy. Heroes of the needle! Heroes of the sewing-machine! Heroes of the attic! Heroes of the eulogium! Heroes and heroines! Bless God for them!

In this roll I also find the heroes who have uncomplainingly endured domestic injustice. There are men who have their toil and anxiety, have no sympathy in their homes. Exhausting application to business gets them a livelihood, but an ungrateful wife scatters it. He is fretted at

from the moment he enters the door until he comes out of it—the exasperations of business life augmented by the exasperations of domestic life. Such men are laughed at, but they have a heart-breaking trouble, and they would have laid down in appalling desolation but for the grace of God.

Society to-day is strewn with the wrecks of men who, under the north-east storm of domestic affliction, have been driven on the rocks. There are tens of thousands of drunks to-day, made such by their wives. That is not poetry; that is prose. But the wrong is generally in the opposite direction. You would not have to go far to find a wife whose life is a perpetual martyrdom—something heavier than a stroke of the lightning, which has smitten her home at midnight and constant maltreatment, which have left her only a wreck of what she was on that day when in the midst of a brilliant assemblage the vows were taken, and the wedding music was playing, and the carriage rolled away with the benediction of the people. What was the burning of Latimer and Ridley at the stake compared with this? Those men soon became unconscious of the fire, but there, a few years' martyrdom, a 50 years' putting to death, yet uncomplaining. No bitter words when the rollicking companions, at 2 o'clock in the morning, the husband died drunk into the front door. No bitter words when, when the swollen blood struck out in a midnight carousal. Bending over the battered and bruised form of his father when he took her from her father's home, promised love and kindness and protection, yet nothing but sympathy and prayers and forgiveness before they are asked for. No bitter words when the family Bible goes for rum and the pawnbroker's shop gets the last decent dinner. Some day, desiring to evoke the story of her sorrows, you say, "Well, how are you getting along now?" and, rallying her trembling voice and quieting her quivering lip, she says, "Pretty well, I thank you; pretty well," she says, "I will tell you. In the delirium of her last sickness she may tell all the other secrets of her lifetime, but she will not tell that. Not until the books of eternity are open, will she know what she has suffered. Oh, ye who are twisting a garland for the victor, put it on that pale brow! When she is dead, the neighbors will beg linen to make her a shroud, and she will be carried out in a plain box, with no silver plate to tell her years of trial and anguish. The gamblers and swindlers who destroy her husband will not come to the funeral. One carriage will be enough for that funeral—one carriage to carry the orphans and the two Christian women who presided over the obsequies.

But there is a flash, a gleam of light, a celestial door is opened. "Lift up your head, ye everlasting gates, and let her come in!" And Christ will step forth and say: "Come in, ye who have suffered with me on earth, ye who have suffered with me in heaven. This is the highest throne in heaven? You say, 'The throne of the Lord God Almighty and the Lamb.' No doubt about it. What is the next highest throne in heaven? Who speaks? It seems to me it will be the throne of the drunkard's wife, if she with cheerful patience endured all her earthly torture. Heroes and heroines!

I find also in this roll the heroes of Christian charity. We all admire the George Peabodys and the James Lees of the earth, who give tens and hundreds of thousands of dollars to good objects. But I am speaking now of those who out of their pinched poverty help other men. We all glorify with me on earth, the glorified with me in heaven. This is the highest throne in heaven? You say, "The throne of the Lord God Almighty and the Lamb." No doubt about it. What is the next highest throne in heaven? Who speaks? It seems to me it will be the throne of the drunkard's wife, if she with cheerful patience endured all her earthly torture. Heroes and heroines!
