night. London, March 8, 4.28 p. m.-Lord Roberts telegraphs that he has captured a Krupp gun, and a number of tents and wagons. The general also announces that Gen. Clements has

occupied Norvals Pont. WAS CRONJE BETRAYED! Antwerp, March 8.-The Vroegpost says that Gen. Cronje was betrayed by Commandant Ferreira, who had been bribed by Cecil Rhodes, and that Ferreira was killed by his own soldiers in consequence. A despatch form Pretoria three weeks ago, said that Ferreira was killed Feb. 8, supposedly by accident.

A BOER BULLETIN. Pretoria, March 5. - Secretary of State Reitz has issued a bulletin to the people. After saying the Govern ment has no official tidings of the surrender of Gen. Cronje, but must accept it as a fact, however painful, he adde: "The Government remains assured that the surrender will not discourage the burghers in their defence of their independence and standing as a nation. The struggle thus far has shown that the republics have vindicated themselves as an independent people. This reverse will not stagger us. In the struggle for our cherished rights our belief remains that whatever happens the Lord still

Owing to the invasion of the Free State by a large force of the enemy, and other circumstances, it became necessary to take up other positions, hence the burghers in Natal have retired to Biggersberg. All the commandoes have reached there safely except a few who retired in the direction of Van-Reenan's Pass. Thus Ladysmith and Kimberley are no more

besieged. FRENCH STILL PURSUES. Poplar Grove Camp, March 8, 9 m.-Gen. French is still in pursuit of the Boers, who are in disorderly retreat. The main force of the British is now near Abraham's Kraal and only 20 miles from Bloemfontein. EFFECT OF THE BLOW.
