STATE OF MIMIC WAR.

Twenty Thousand Troops Take Part In Military Manoeuvres.

London, Sept. 3.—A state of warfare, which will continue throughout the week, commenced yesterday morning on the military area known as Salisbury Plain. The troops of one district are being pitted against those of another, 20,000 men of all ranks being engaged, this being the ultra strength of an Aldershot command.

Lieut.Gen. Ian Hamilton, commander of the southern district, with ten thousand troops, is playing the part of an invader from "Blue Land," described as a country situated several days steaming from "Bed Land," upon which shores Hamilton has effected a landing.

The defending force is under the command of Major-Gen. Sir Frederick Stopford. Mariborough is supposed to be the chief harbor on the east coast and the only other place suitable for landing troops are Figdean and Wilton Bay. "Red Land" is supposed to have as its capital "Red-town," which is laid down as situated 40 miles west of Bath.

A certain engagement is assumed to have occurred, and arrangements are understood to have been made for capturing "Red Town." All the various mobilizations, marchings, establishments of garrisons, etc., having been effected the cavalry brigades of the two forces are expected to come in touch to-day. Then the work will go without intermission, as in actual warfare, one phase of the campaign merging itself into another until the problem set for elucidation is solved.

Reminding their men that public spirit led the landholders to place their ground at the disposal of the military anthorities, the officers have announced that endeavors have been made to aveid damage and annoyance, and that the game on the land-owners preserves, particularly, must not be molested. New Schedule Issued at Ottawa on Liberal Scale.

Ottawa, Sept. 3.—The salaries of he country postmasters have been

Ottawa, Sept. 3.—The salaries of the country postmasters have been increased.

In the past country postmasters have been serving on a minimum salary of \$25 a year with 40 per cent. of the first \$800 revenue of the office each year, 25 per cent. on all revenue from \$800 to \$10,000, and 15 per cent. on all revenue over \$10,000.

The new scale increases the minimum allowance to \$36, with 50 per cent. of the first \$1,000 revenue of the office in each year, 30 per cent. on all revenue between \$1,000 and \$10,000, and \$20 on all above \$10,000.

At present an extra payment is made postmasters who have to be on duty after 10 p. m. or before 6 a. m. The minimum extra allowance has been \$6 and the maximum \$60, according to the time employed.

The new plan for extra payment changes the hours to 9 p. m. and 7 a. m., while the minimum allowance is increased to \$10 and the maximum extra allowance to \$100.

At present there is a forward allowance of 10 per cent. of the revenue of the office when forwarding is done direct and 5 per cent. when forwarding is indirect or through another office. The new scale is 12.1-2 per cent. for both.

BLACK HUNDREDS RIOT.

Odessa, Sept. 3.—The Black Hundreds began rioting here yesterday afternoon, alleging that the Jews were responsible for the explosion of the bomb in the courtyard of the central police station here Saturday morning, resulting in the deaths of an artillery officer and four policemen, although it was stated at the time that the bomb was accidentally dropped by the officer.

The mob indulged in other brutal excesses, and beat down viotims with flexible rubber sticks. The Jewish cemetery, where thousands of Jews were praying at the gravesides of their dead, was the scale of a flerce onslaught.


