JAPS ARE WISE.

Byond the announcement that a Japanese force had effected a landing at an unnamed place on the Hao-Tung pen asula and the giving out of Admiral Hosoya's report, the Government absolutely refuses to disclose the nature of the plan of operations. Gen. Fukushima, of the General staff, merely told the foreign correspondents that on May 5, some strength of the Japanese army began to land on the Loa Tung Pennsula. "Where and what force?" asked correspondents Gen. Fukushima smiled. "East, west, north or south?" inquired a correspondent "out of the skies; from heaven," said Gen. Fukushima.

ATTACK THEIR OWN MEN. Tokio, May 6-Noon.-General Kur oki, in reporting yesterday, tells of a bloody encounter during the Russian retreat on Sunday last, when, accord-ing to information furnished by a ne-tive, a body of Russian infantry, two tive, a body of Russian infantry, two thousand strong, occupying a hill near Teng Shang Hong, mistook for Japanese a detachment of their own in fantry, about 200 strong, retiring be fore the Japanese troops, and fough among themselves. In the scuffle In were killed and seventy wounded, and the Rus ian horses were stangeded leaving their loads of stores behind.

According to the story told by a cap tured Russian officer, who participal ed in the battle on Sunday last, onlifive or six battalions of Russian in fautry and two battalions of artiller were able to retire in order. The other troops run away in a state of critic confusion.

THE JAPS CHARGED THEM. Gen. Kuroki says that a Japaner patrol consisting of fourteen mar-reached Teng Shang Hong on the 3r inst, when a Russian patrol post-ed on a hill south of the village at-tacked them. The Japanese patrol thereupon turned and charged them, and after an intrepid hand-to-hand affray the enemy was driven back in the direction of Feng Wang Cheng. The Japanese patrol pursued them to The Japanese patrol pursued them to a stream three miles south-west of Kaolimen, where Russan sentries were discovered posted on hills on both sides of the road.
