On May 6 a passenger train from Port Arthur was fired upon a mile and a quarter outside Polandan (about forty miles north of Port Arthur) by about one hundred Japanese infantrymen, capturing the locomotive east of the railway. The train carried many passengers, 200 sick occupying an ambulance carriage flying the Red Cross flag. Two of the sick were wounded. The train succeeded in reaching Polandan. Transquility prevails in the maritime province again in Yinkow.
