Church Meeting.

The congregation of St John's church, Wolfville, held their annual meeting on Easter Monday, April 7th. It was a fairly representative one, several gentlemen from Kentville being present to represent the congregation of St James', Kentville.

The Rector, Rev. Dr Brock, opened the meeting with prayer, after which the outgoing Wardens' accounts were presented, and found very satisfactory, for in addition to paying all current liabilities, all the debt contracted to repair and alter the church, has been paid, still leaving a small balance in the hands of the Wardens. The "Ladies' Guild" also has a nice sum on hand.

The Wardens and Vestry were then elected for the coming year; the Wardens being Mr Frank A. Dixon, and Mr Walter Brown.

Capt. Tuzo and Mr Chas. Smith, were elected delegates to the Synod; with Mr S. Prat and Mr F. Masters as substitutes. Lay delegates to Synod, to represent the Parish at Kings College centennial.

After quite an animated discussion it was decided to increase the Rector's salary by one hundred dollars per annum.

A resolution in regard to the proposed Mission Chapel at Grand Pre was then submitted to the meeting and passed unanimously.

That whereas it has come to the knowledge of this meeting that it is proposed to build a Mission Chapel in Grand Pre, and

Whereas said Chapel cannot be served by the Rector of this Parish, and would in our opinion necessitate a division of this Parish; therefore

Resolved that in the opinion of this meeting the time has not arrived for such a division.

It is ordered that a copy of the above resolution be forwarded to the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

And with votes of thanks to the outgoing Wardens, organist, Mrs C. H. Borden, and Vestry Clerk, a most satisfactory meeting came to a close by the Rector pronouncing the benediction.

The Rector has handed me a report of his parish work for the last year, from which I select a few of the principal points, which may be of general interest.

Sunday services, 192; week day do, 87; public celebrations of Holy Communion, 47; private do, 14; baptisms children 59; adults, 12; persons confirmed, 28; marriages, 8; burials, 6; losses during year, 15; gains do, 57; No. of communicants, 288. This includes both Wolfville and Kentville.


