ARMSTRONG & HIGGINS.The schooner Price Brothers was total-  
ly destroyed by fire in the Apple River  
state on Tuesday, 12th. She was bound  
from Canby for Boston with a cargo of  
wood. The Price Brothers was 79 tons  
weight and was built at Parrabro in  
1891. She was owned by J. H. Card, of  
Parrabro, and others. There is some  
insurance on her in St. John offices. The  
cargo was owned by S. Sheffield, Esq.,  
and was fully insured.Mr. Charles E. Brown, formerly of the  
firm of Brown Brothers & Co., of Halifax,  
from which he retired in 1888, died on  
Sunday at San Diego, California, aged 68  
years. Mr. Brown has been abroad for a  
couple of years in search of health, he  
having suffered severely from rheuma-  
tism. The cause of death was heart  
failure. He leaves a widow and several  
children. Mrs. DeWitt, of Wolfville, is a  
daughter.On Friday morning last as Mr. A. G.  
Morrison, of this town, was walking on  
the railway track about a half mile west  
of the station, he observed the rail to be  
as considered in an unsafe condition  
in consequence of a broken rib-plate,  
probably caused by the passage of a  
heavy train. He at once proceeded to  
the station and notified Mr. Graves, the  
agent, who at once communicated with  
the authorities at Kentville. On the  
arrival of the express from Halifax,  
which was about due, Mr. Morrison was  
asked to go on the engine and point out  
the dangerous place to the driver. The  
train was able to pass the place in safety  
by running very slowly, and repairs were  
at once made. The condition of the rail  
was observed in time by Mr. Morrison, as a  
serious accident might have resulted had  
the train attempted to pass the place at
