The Gadfly. The Baptist church was hardly large enough to hold the immense audience of ladies that rushed out to hear Mrs. Wright, Dominion President of the W. C. T. U. Mrs. Wright is the finest speaking female ever heard in these parts. She has a fine presence, is eloquent. She marshals her facts as ladies are not usually inclined to do. If her family at home is not suffering because of her absence, we wish her God speed in a noble work. It is said that Canada and all America is the paradise of women. If that is true, we do not need to fret over our civilization. There is great virtue in any land where women are respected and protected, and where the kids are happy. No human civilization can rise higher than the spirit of a good woman. It is a beastly doctrine which teaches only the survival of the fittest. It is a better and higher doctrine which teaches to restore the unfit, to renew the diseased, to give life to dead hearts, and that is just what our noble ladies are doing. We turn with anger and disgust from the British Suffragettes, but at the back of the mind lies a suspicion that there is a shrewd method in this madness. British public opinion has often been shocked out of its sleep. The whole history of political reform shows that more enter by violence than by praying and fasting. It seems certain that the suffragettes have gained more ground by turbulence and easy martyrdom than they could have won in the same space of time by quiet and orderly advocacy. It is a relief to turn from the literature and every day story of those women who spend their whole life in selfish so-called pleasures, to the story of the work done by the White Ribbon Band of Women and similar organizations. On the one hand we are shown the lives of women whose entire life has been employed in a search for pleasure. Millions are spent on some of the most useless fancies, in clothes that they cannot wear, in buildings they are unable to occupy, in journeys that are aimless, except that they get rid of money to say the least. In the other case we find women active, alert, doing good and enjoying life for the benefits they can confer on others. The theory that happiness comes from participating in all sorts of alleged pleasures is fallacious. Real happiness is to be found in the utilizing of one's powers for the welfare of the community. Women have invaded a hundred vocations. They are in the shops, in schools and churches. They are out on mission fields, and even in the civil service. Their influence in the great causes of social and moral reform cannot be estimated, but in no spot on this green earth has the influence of woman been so great as in the home. A good nation without good mothers is an impossibility. We often question whether it would not be better for the home and the nation if we had more 'Hannas,' who remained at home and trained the 'Samuels,' instead of indulging in the public ministrations. In any case we wish them well, and to the last duct we are willing to help in any of their enterprises, whether they be wise or unwise, useful or nonsensical, sane or crazy. Death's Harvest. We regret to record the death of Mrs. Margaret Casack, which took place last Friday at her residence on Main street. She had been ailing for a few days, but no serious consequences were anticipated, and her death was quite sudden and apparently painless. The funeral took place last Sunday afternoon at St. John's church and was conducted by Rev. R. F. Dixon, Mrs. Casack, whose maiden name was Margaret Kelly, was born in Halifax 73 years ago. Her father served all his life in the British army, including 21 years as magazine keeper in Halifax. About 1857 she was married to the late Major Casack, of the King's Own (Liverpool) Regiment, a distinguished Crimean officer. On his retirement from the army, about the end of the seventies, they settled in Wolfville. Mrs. Casack had two children, a son who died in infancy, and Mrs. Eastwood, of this town. She leaves four grand-children and two great-grand-children. She will be greatly missed in St. John's church, of which she was a faithful and exemplary member. A person of sterling character and of modest and retiring disposition, she was deeply esteemed and respected by all who came in close contact with her. The death of Miss Alice M. Eaton took place at the home of her sister, Mrs. Herbert Stairs, Hill street, on an early hour last Friday morning. Deceased was the youngest daughter of the late Leander and Pauline Eaton, of Canada, and was 43 years of age. She was educated at Canada and at Acadia Seminary. Of an unusually strong constitution she undermined her health by continuous and most devoted attention lavished upon an invalid mother. The funeral service was held on Sunday at 3 p. m., conducted by Rev. F. H. Beals and J. F. McCurdy. Dr. Kempton gave an address which touched the hearts of all present. The funeral was one of the largest ever held in Cornwallis. Burial took place in the cemetery at Canada corner.
