CROPS AND MARKETS

Hay Light, Potatoes Good But Dull
Prospects for a Market

Throughout the country generally crops are well up to the average. The backward spring and the long continued cool weather kept vigorous growth back, but July has been a full month of "great growing weather."

The hay crop is being gathered in good shape but is of rather poor quality. This is owing to cool weather in June and the abundant growth of weeds. Timothy is stunted, but there has so far been good weather for curing it. There will be less No. 1 timothy than last year, but an abundance of cattle hay as there never was a heavier clover crop.

The potato acreage is somewhat larger than ever and the stand is looking fine. Another month of favorable weather will assure a full crop. No diseases have as yet shown themselves, but the old striped bug has "come back". Paris green and spraying have pretty well done for its ravages, however.

All over Canada the potato promises a great yield. Ontario and Quebec crops are showing exceptionally good. Dealers are uneasy over the market prospects and one of the largest dealers said this was causing a good deal of alarm. Owing to the heavy Ontario crop they will have potatoes for export rather than requiring to import them. There is no chance of getting into the United States market this year.

Oats and wheat are heading out and a few weeks more warm weather will make certain a full crop.

Root crops in general are doing well. It has been a good year for pasturage and the butter yield has been good. Prices have been well maintained.

The demand for beef cattle is still heavy and cannot be supplied. It appears, however, more calves are being raised than ever before—a good sign.

The price of eggs has kept up well throughout the season.

Apples promise an excellent crop in most localities.

Glaseville
