Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Fleming, Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Storey, and Mr. G. H. Greene, of St. John, arrived here yesterday in Mr. Fleming's yacht and are guests at the Queen Hotel.

On Suspended Sentence.

One drunk appeared in the police court this morning, but was allowed to go. He has not been arrested for nearly a year and on this account Magistrate Limerick released him on suspended sentence.

Theft Case on Tuesday.

The young boys charged with destroying the strawberry beds of Mr. A. H. F. Randolph, at his residence at Frogmore, will appear in the police court on Tuesday morning. The youngsters will also face a charge of stealing from Mr. Randolph's orchard.

No Deaths for 21 Days.

No deaths have been reported in Fredericton for the past twenty-one days, establishing a record in this city for the length of time elapsing without a death occurring. The last death recorded was on June 26th, and up to noon today none had been reported in this city.

Married at St. Paul.

Word has been received here of the wedding at St. Paul Minn., of Miss Freda E. Miller, formerly of this city, and Mr. John J. Schoeller, of Wadena, Minn. The bride is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Miller, who resided in this city. Mr. Austin Dunphy, of this city, is an uncle of the bride.

The Big Game Season.

The Department of Lands and Mines are anticipating a great season for big game hunting. Many applications for information on the big game hunting in this province have been received at the department already. The department have issued posters announcing the \$5 license for non-resident anglers. These posters also give the names of the vendors in each county. There has been a great many applications for angling licenses received by the department this season.

Extending Hassam Pavement.

The work of extending the Hassam Pavement on Carleton street, to the Fredericton-St. Marys Highway Bridge is being done by Mr. J. M. Chappell, of this city. The tenders were called for some time ago and Mr. Chappell's was the lowest, his price being \$580. The cost of the work is being borne by the City and Provincial governments, each paying one-half. Only one side of the road is being laid at a time in order to allow access to the bridge.

That Seized Liquor.

The police have served W. E. Hanlon, one of the parties to whom the liquor seized at the Dominion Express Company's office was addressed, with a summons to appear in the police court on Tuesday morning, to show cause why the liquor should not be destroyed. According to the police, Mr. Hanlon claims that he knows nothing about the shipment of liquor which was addressed to him. The police have been unable to discover anyone in this city by the name of John Lowe, and are convinced that no such person resides here.

Daring Robbery at Gibson.

A daring robbery took place at the residence of Mr. George H. VanWart, Gibson, when a young man entered the house by one of the windows and stole \$45 from Mr. VanWart's trousers. The burglar after making this haul went into the room occupied by one of the ladies in the house. He was about to ransack the clothes closet in this room, when the lady awakened. The thief made good his escape, however, before she could give an alarm, but from the description of the man given to Detective Roberts, who is working on the case, the latter believes he will be able to make an arrest soon.

Death of Mont M. Wiley.

Word was received here this morning of the death, which occurred yesterday at Oakland, California, of Mont M. Wiley, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Wiley, of this city. The late Mr. Wiley was 33 years of age, and has been in California for the past two years. He has been sick over a year and his death was not unexpected. He was at one time employed in the Royal Bank of Canada, in this city, but left here about ten years ago. He was married and is survived by a wife and one child. Besides his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Wiley, of this city, two brothers, Dr. Wiley, of Calistville, Montana, and Harold Wiley, of Sand Point, Idaho, and two sisters, Mrs. Luke S. Morrison, of this city, and Mrs. William Cooper, of Kansas City, survive. It is not known where the remains will be brought here or interred at Oakland.

VISIT DOMINIONS ROYAL COMMISSION TO CITY IN AUGUST

About Fifty Delegates Are Expected to Arrive Here on August 14.

BOARD OF TRADE TO ENTERTAIN THEM

Commission is Reporting on Natural Resources of the Dominions.

The visit of the Dominions Royal Commission to this city on August 14th is creating considerable interest. The Commission during their stay in this city will be entertained by the Board of Trade, who have appointed an entertainment committee to look after this part of the programme. The committee are making arrangements for an auto drive about the city, as well as a visit to the Douglas Room. The party, which is to arrive here by a special steamer from St. John, numbers about fifty.

What is the Commission?

The Dominions Royal Commission was appointed on April 15, 1912, by the Imperial Conference for the purpose of enquiring into and reporting on the natural resources of the Dominions of the Empire, the development of such resources, the facilities that may be created for the production, manufacture and distribution of articles of commerce in the British Dominions; the requirements of each Dominion and of the United Kingdom in the matter of food and raw materials and the sources of supply available for these, the trade between the Dominions and between the various Dominions and the rest of the world; the effect upon trade of the laws now in force and how trade may be improved and extended.

Arrive Early in August.

The Commission is now about to make its visit to Canada. Arriving at Sydney during the first week in August, the Commission will hold court in Nova Scotia, and about August 10th the Commission will hold court in St. John. On August 14th they will visit Fredericton and while no court will be held here the visit will be for the purpose of gaining an intimate knowledge of local conditions, and what this city's contribution is to the Imperial welfare.

The following names appear as the personal staff of the Dominions Royal Commission: Sir Vincent, K. C. M. G., Sir Henry Rider Haggard, Tom Garrett, Esq., William Lorimer, Esq., Joseph Tatlow, Esq., Sir Alfred Edmund Bateman, K. C. M. G., The Honorable George Elias Foster, LL.D., Donald Campbell, Esq., LL.B., The Honorable Robert Sinclair, Sir J. W. S. Langerman, and the Honorable Edgar Rennie Bowring.

Lines of Investigation.

The channels through which the Commission will gather its information will be mainly statistical records and reports regarding industrial development, development of railways, steamship and other transportation, postal and telegraph service, as well as the development of natural resources such as agriculture, mineral, timber, water power and irrigation and fisheries.

LIVELY SESSION AT POLICE COURT

Police Magistrate Limerick Threatens to Commit J. F. VanBuskirk for Contempt

The session of the police court this morning was enlivened somewhat by the threat of Police Magistrate Limerick to commit Mr. J. F. VanBuskirk to jail for contempt.

The trouble arose over the fact that the police had reported Mr. VanBuskirk's teamster, Mr. Frank DeLong, for obstructing the sidewalk in front of the former's warehouse on Campbell street. When Mr. DeLong was called this morning Mr. VanBuskirk, who was in court, stated that he represented his teamster. Police Magistrate Limerick said that Mr. DeLong would have to appear himself and Mr. VanBuskirk had him appear.

Detective Roberts went on the stand and gave evidence to the effect that the team was obstructing the sidewalk for some time on the day the report was made. Mr. DeLong claimed it was impossible to load the machinery, etc., from a team to Mr. VanBuskirk's warehouse without backing up to the door and obstructing the sidewalk for a few minutes. The Magistrate fined him \$1 and costs, however, and when the sentence was pronounced Mr. VanBuskirk started to assail Detective Roberts, at the same time telling the Magistrate to fine him VanBuskirk for what he had said to the officer.
