EDITORIAL NOTES.

Enjoyment, not noise and parade, was the order of Dominion Day in Hamilton.

How dearly the Tory organs hate Mr. Tarte! Their bitterness toward him is the tribute which political corruption pays to its exposé.

Does anybody suspect that any of the Dominion Day excursionists smuggled any tobacco or cigarettes from Buffalo? Perish the thought! But as opportunity makes the thief, the chance to profit develops the smuggler.

The Montreal Star is now denouncing the "multiplication of Cabinet Ministers." The Star gently cooed the praises of the Tory Government while the multiplying was being done. If there are too many Cabinet Ministers the Star is not in a position to complain.

Sir Richard got Parliament prorogued and the supply bill assented to before the end of the fiscal year, and now the money in the public treasury can be expended decently and in order, without resort to Governor-General's warrants or other expedients. So far so good.

It is said that Benham, of Batavia, N. Y., who is now on trial charged with poisoning his wife, got his idea of the use of prussic acid from an account of the Hooper poisoning case in the Port Hope Guide. Now watch for the moralist who argues that newspapers ought not to report crimes.

The London Free Press heads its editorial on the disposal of the London election petition and the remarks of Justice Robertson "A Legal Scandal." That is putting it strongly. But is it too strong? Is it an improper designation of such a result after such an exposure?

By a vote of 83 to 32 the United States Senate refused to include lumber in the free list, and by a vote of 32 to 31 it reduced the duty on white pine from \$2 to \$1 a thousand feet. The Senate has done better than it once proposed to do; it narrowly escaped coming to a common sense conclusion.

It is not to be wondered that the process of the courts in the States is so inefficient. Police operate the "sweat box" in secret; the jury is chosen for its ignorance, and the press tries the case before the court, daily commenting at length on the testimony and attacking or defending the accused. The reports of the Benham murder trial in the Buffalo papers are a disgrace to a people who would see justice done.

The Hamilton Herald, in half apology for its mean insinuations and false statements about the Liberals in the Drummond County deal, says it stated the story was quoted from hostile sources, and adds: "It will thus be seen that in the opinion of the Times, it is 'maliciously maligning the Liberals' even to print the fact that charges are made against a Liberal Government." But it was not a fact that "charges" were made, and the Herald's excuse does not account for the animus shown in its comments. They were malicious and cowardly beyond those of many of the openly Tory sheets.

The Mail and Empire, speaking of the Drummond County Railway bargain, says, "There was a railway which cost \$400,000, and it was to be transferred from Mr. Tarte's friends, who owned it, to the country, for no less a sum than \$1,505,000." The organ's persistent attempt to spread this falsehood shows how weak is its cause. The 90 miles of road built were not built and equipped for \$400,000—less than \$4,500 a mile—nor double the money; and besides that 90 miles the company must for the sum to be paid complete and hand over about 45 miles more. A cause that has to be bolstered up by such deliberate falsehood as that of which the chief Tory organ is guilty is a very poor cause.

Government employees' wages are not subject to lien save by consent, and so much has this exemption from process of law been abused by the employees in the Railway Department, that the General Manager of the Intercolonial has issued the following circular:

Intercolonial Railway. — General Manager's Office, Moncton, N. B., 15th June, 1897.—Circular 277. To all employees.—I am directed to inform you that the Railway Department expects you to pay your just debts, and that anyone who neglects or refuses to do so will be dismissed from the service. —D. Pottinger, General Manager.

The rule is a good rule to enforce. It is a disgrace that deadbeats should be allowed to draw Government pay and live by defrauding their grocers and tailors.
