CABINET REQUESTED TO ADOPT QUEBEC SCALE IN PROVINCE

A delegation of 50 members repre-
sentative of the New Brunswick
Lumbermen's Association, the Board
of Trade and the commercial life of
the province waited upon the Pro-
vincial Government in Fredericton
on Tuesday urging the introduction
of the Quebec scale and a reduction
in stumpage rates on lumber cut upon
Crown lands down to figures equal
those charged in Quebec.

The Quebec stumpage rate is about
\$2.70 per 1,000 and the New Brun-
swick rate is \$4. The Quebec system
of scaling counts 1,000 feet of logs as
about equal to about 1,500 feet in
New Brunswick, it is stated.

As Premier Veniot informed the
delegation that the Government
would give due consideration to the
request on these two points only, a
third point in the lumbermen's re-
quest to the effect that any re-
duction in the scale determined upon
should be made retroactive to in-
clude the cut of the season 1924-1925
was not presented in detail.

Practically the whole of the even-
ing's session was given over to the
hearing of the delegation which was
fully representative of all the lumber-
ing and milling sections of the prov-
ince, and also of the Boards of Trade.

The Boards of Trade were those of
the following places, Fredericton,
Bathurst, Moncton, Newcastle, St.
John, Campbellton, Chatham, Grand
Falls and Edmundston. In addition a
number of important commercial
houses in various parts of the prov-
ince were represented. The delegation
presented a resolution which was
passed by the Lumbermen's Associa-
tion at a meeting held some time ago.

ASK HALF HOLIDAYS IN CAMPBELLTON

CAMPBELLTON, June 3.—The
sport leaders of Campbellton, in or-
der to promote sport, have been as-
tating a half holiday on Wednesday
afternoon of each week. It was learn-
ed today that the majority of the
business men have agreed to close.
This will be of great assistance to
the North Shore Baseball League, as
all games can be played on that after-
noon. The ball diamond is not yet
completed and is not expected to be
until sometime next week at the
earliest.

TWO CONVENTIONS OF LIBERAL PARTY SET FOR THIS WEEK

FREDERICTON, June 3.—The Pro-
vincial Government ended its June
session here this afternoon. Premier
Veniot stated at the close of the
meeting that the time this afternoon
had been taken up largely with re-
ports on hydro matters and confer-
ences with counsel relative to set-
tling claims connected with the Grand
Falls hydro-electric developments.
All claims were settled or on way to
settlement, the Premier said.

Premier Veniot announced today
that a convention of supporters of
the Provincial Government in the
County of Westmorland would be
held at Dorchester on June 8. A
similar convention for Kent county
will be held at Rexton on June 9.

The Bureau of Health of the prov-
ince is to meet at the Health Centre,
St. John, on Thursday and Friday,
according to announcement by Hon.
F. Roberts, Minister of Health.

The Board of Education held a
meeting this morning and dealt with
a number of matters. The Town of
Fredericton, which had made applica-
tion at a previous session to come
under the Vocational Education Act,
again had its application under con-
sideration and the Board decided to
approve it.

W. M. Burns, principal of the Mod-
ern School in this city, applied for
six months' leave of absence. The
leave was granted. Miss Mary
McGee, of the teaching staff of
the Modern School, resigned her po-
sition and the resignation was accept-
ed. Miss Mildred Haines, at present
teaching school in Pennfield, was ap-
pointed to the position.

French Noblemen Arrive at Quebec

They Will Study Agricultural Methods in Canada.

Marquis Gaston de Levis and his
friend Count de Maleisayod Melun,
were passengers on the Canadian Pacific
S. S. Minnedosa, which arrived in Mon-
treal last week. The two young French
noblemen are in Canada to study Cana-
dian agricultural methods and are going
direct to Ottawa, where they will be the
guests of George Gonthier, Auditor-Gen-
eral of Canada.

Marquis de Levis is a direct descendant
of the French nobles, who bore the
same name and title, and who had some-
thing to do with the making of Canadian

history when he became famous as a re-
sult of the battle of St. Foye, not far
from the plains of Abraham, in 1760.

The two distinguished travellers are
each 21 years of age, but they are al-
ready well known to hundreds of Cana-
dians who have visited Paris.

They own beautiful farms on the out-
skirts of the French capital and are thus
able to take part in any society event
taking place there.

Last week, Count de Maleisayod
Melun, gave a dinner at the club In-
ternationale, at which several prominent
Canadians were guests.

The two young friends intend visiting
all the other Canadian Provinces after
leaving Ottawa, before returning to
France.

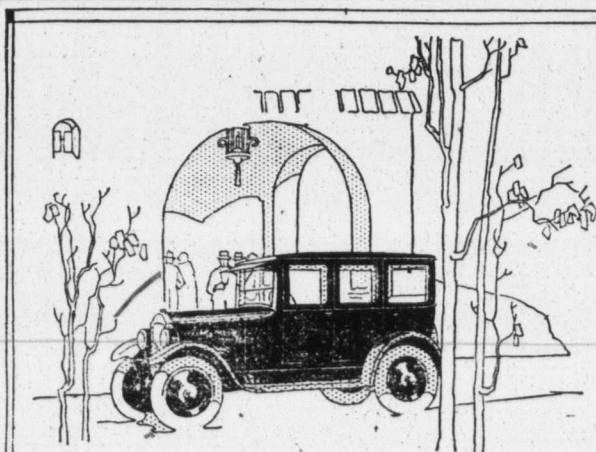
