In the face of doubled and trebled taxation on the part of the Dominion of Canada, it was not intended, it was never contemplated by the framers of our confederation that the people should be subjected to direct taxation. Such taxation should not be imposed. We should

receive enough subsidy to carry on the public affairs of the Province, without having to resort to direct taxation; and the government and people of P. E Island ought not to rest satisfied until a sufficient suvsidy has been obtained. Mr Mo-Donald then referred to the need of a better means of communication and spoke of the tunnel schemes that had been entertained for improvement in this regard.
