(Continued from first page.) civil service, and establishment of control by a non-partisan commission. There is the record of one more refusal to investigate or to reform. The Commons chamber still echoes with the sad Government wall over the conduct of its own commission, which had the audacity to discover and reveal a miserable fact. Lastly, we have a miserable attempt to cover up these disclosures by a whitewashing commission.

FISHING MONOPOLISTS UNSATISFIED.

Some of the favoured persons who have acquired from 9 to 21 year monopolies of fishing in the Slave Lakes, the Athabasca, the Nelson River and its tributaries, James Bay and its tributaries, and numerous lakes and rivers in the far North and West, testify that they have not yet made money out of their deals. Mr McNe, who pays \$10 per year for a 21-year fishing monopoly of a large part of the coast of James Bay and of many rivers, says the concession has not brought him anything, because he has no means of transporting the fish. The Government knew when this lease was granted that the locality was not then accessible. But a railway is projected to James Bay, which is expected to make the fishing monopoly extremely valuable long before its expiration in 1924. It is now held for speculative purposes. Why could not the Government have held this and other rights for the people? Some of the more accessible concessions are said to have changed hands at large prices.

A PUGSLEY BANQUET.

The Minister of Public Works has been harried by friends in Montreal, to whom he expressed deep regret that his critics in the House do not conduct themselves as gentlemen. Mr Pugsley did not explain why he has so far failed to bring forward in Parliament the obnoxious against Mr Borden which he so valiantly preferred on the platform when Mr Borden was 3,000 miles away. A man of this disposition naturally does not approve the conduct of members who make charges against him when he is present. It is worth noting that the chairman of the Pugsley banquet was Mr. Peter Lysal, who has a contract in Mr Pugsley's department for Montreal post office buildings, and is getting much larger contracts for Transcontinental buildings.

THEY SEE THE END.

Political prospects are evidently discouraging to Government supporters. Several have announced that they will not be candidates at the next election. Among these are Mr. Gallibrer, of Kenyon, Mr. Bole of Winnipeg, Mr. Oyr of St. Boniface, and Mr. McCarthy of Simcoo. Mr Oyr is one of the members who owe their election to the "thin red line" conspiracy of 1904.

ANOTHER REPULSE.

Two or three times during the last fortnight complaint has been made in the House that undue influence was used to compel I. C. R. employees at Halifax to support an active Liberal, who is also a Government official, in his candidacy for the position of Mayor. Messrs. Robins and Carey, would the Halifax by virtue of the fact that they here for four years obstructed an election trial, left Parliament to take charge of this civic election in the party interest. In these circumstances the defeat of their candidate by nearly a thousand majority, and the election of an active Conservative is a matter of some political interest.

1905, which showed the employment of 4,587 hands in that year, while in 1901 the number was 6,750. The value of products fell from \$7,359,000 to \$5,717,000. The trade returns show that the quantity of wool imported for manufacture in 1908 was 6,129,216 pounds, while in 1898 it was 11,785,899. The value of woolen manufactured goods imported increased from \$5,115,909 in 1898 to \$21,213,234 in 1908.

Budget Debate.

SPEECH OF MR. A. J. McDONALD.

Mr. McDonald resumed the debate on the Budget. He said that in view of the very able speech just delivered by the Leader of the Opposition, it might not be necessary for him to say anything further in respect to our claims. Education and Public Works—these are the things in respect to which this Island has gone behind. We have not had sufficient revenue to properly maintain them. We should have an increased sum for education. We have all heard of free education as a blessing brought to P. E. Island by Coles, Whelan and Haviland. It was proposed by these men that the schools should be free to all the children on the island; and provision was made to that effect. But many changes have taken place since then. The supplements paid to the teachers under the act of 1879 have been taken away. That was a mistake. Improvements are required. But instead of improvement there is retrogression—because the teachers are insufficiently paid. Agriculture too, ought to be improved.

The expenditures of the Agricultural Department are it is true, increasing. But the results are not so certain. In the asylum there has also been increased expenditures. At the time of Confederation we were told by the old Irish people, and the people of Irish descent that this small province would be kept in the Union just as Ireland was kept back, and that P. E. Island would become another Ireland. These people seem to have the right idea. Mr. McDonald then directed the attention of the Commissioner of Public Works to a duty which he has neglected. He pointed out that the ferry at Cardigan is one of the oldest ferries on the Island. A substantial wharf was built there and was completed—all but putting the piles around it. The piles were put in improperly. Bye and bye the whole thing went out into the river. For the want of a little care and an expenditure of a few dollars at the right time, thousands of dollars were lost, and the job has not been restored.

After recess, Mr. McDonald resumed the debate on the Budget. He noted the fact that members of the Government had taken credit to themselves for the building of steel bridges. It may be all very well to build these bridges. But such bridges are now being built everywhere and the government deserve no credit for introducing them here. Some of the bridges are said to be very good. The substructures of others are said to be crumbling away. In Ontario they are building bridges of concrete; and it might be well for the Commissioner to adopt a suggestion drawn from this fact. The world is not standing still; and the government ought not to stand still in regard to these matters. Neither ought they to expect credit for such improvements, when they simply fall in the wake of neighboring provinces.

Mr. McDonald then referred to the ever increasing direct taxation imposed upon the people of this province. In the face of doubled and trebled taxation on the part of the Dominion of Canada, it was not intended, it was never contemplated by the framers of our constitution that the people should be subjected to direct taxation. Such taxation should not be imposed. We should
