IMPORTANT NOTICE.

The announcement at Ottawa that the Grand Trunk Pacific is making purchase of property in St. John, is taken as evidence of an intention that the road will be doing business from that city within a very short time.

Mr. F. H. Baer, of the firm of Baer and Goff, of this city, on Saturday received official notification from Ottawa of his appointment to the office of customs appraiser, made vacant by the death of the late Mr. Robert Hogg.

Mr. Reginald Harris, Barrister of Halifax, has won the one hundred guinea prize offered through the Standard of Empire, and open for competition throughout the Empire, the subject was "Governance of the Empire."

It is reported from Ottawa that the Canadian Government has decided to send a sailing party out for the piercer George Caldwell, who started from Hudson's Bay to cross Northern Canada in 1908, and has not since been heard from.

An explosion occurred at the open hearth furnace of the Dominion Steel Co., Sydney, C. B., on Saturday. Three men were seriously burned by the flying metal and were severely injured. Superintendent Mackay was the most badly injured. All will recover.

Last Friday night a small shack occupied by William Cope and his wife, at Cobalt, Ont., was discovered to be on fire. The house burned in a few minutes and both Cope and his wife were suffocated, their bodies being taken out shortly afterwards.

After a lengthy search, by the Russian authorities and when they had almost been given up as lost, 50 fishermen were rescued from a perilous position on an ice floe in the Gulf of Finland. The men were set adrift near Peterhof of the ice breaking away from the shore. They suffered many hardships.

The battleship of the future may be 50 per cent larger than present Dreadnoughts. This is the prediction of Admiral Bacon, Commander of the original Dreadnought. The size of the ship and the power of the guns must, he says, increase until actual war confirms the present theories of Naval Construction.

It is now considered certain at Ottawa that the Hon. Mr. Fisher will shortly resign his seat in the House of Commons to go to the Senate as Senator for the Division held by the late Senator Baker. Senator Fisher will take with him the Portfolio of Agriculture, and thus give the Upper House the Cabinet Minister for which it has been calling.

On Friday last Mr. Richard Gavin, a well known and respected farmer, living near Fighish, met death very suddenly and under most circumstances. He was returning home from the grist mill and by some means was thrown under his sleigh from the top of a grist of grain, the sleigh runners passing over his neck and killing him almost instantly. He was within a half-mile of his home when the accident took place. Deceased was 63 years of age and leaves a family to mourn.

Two men engaged in fighting the flames at Stellarton on the 16th were carried out of the mine overcome by fire damp, but they recovered when brought to the surface. When the officials say that they have the fire under control, they do not mean that the flames are being extinguished, but that they are in hopes of confining the fire to the portion of the mine in which it is raging. This they are doing by building a wall across the three openings, which will shut off the air and make it possible to flood the section out, about one third of the mine. The wall will be finished in a short time if no accidents occur.

Herr Dirksen, in the Reichstag Berlin, on the 16th, made the surprising proposition that the Government Secret Service funds be used in an attempt to influence the opinion of the foreign press in favor of Germany. He asserted that such a course was necessary in order, energetically and quickly to counteract the effects of the present attacks on Germany—which, he said, was universally disliked. Herr Dirksen explained that the desired end might be accomplished by securing the insertion of articles in the newspapers.

Word has been received of an accident at McNeill's siding, on the Crow's Nest Branch by which two men lost their lives and one was fatally injured. The freaks of Suffragette hitherto has caused more amusement than annoyance to Londoners, but indignation was kindled when several of them drove a fire engine at high speed through the West End streets, at a busy hour. The women, wearing firemen's uniforms, managed the engine, which was decked with Suffragette colors. The familiar note of the gong caused traffic to draw aside to let the engine pass.

Commander Peary has cut short his lecture tour in the South. According to New York advices, the refusal of Governor Brown, of Georgia, to introduce him to an Atlanta audience, his reference to the Commander as a "Faker," and the small crowd that attended the lecture, brought forth the announcement that his plans had been changed. Thus far Commander Peary has declined to submit his proofs to the authorities on the ground that he is under contract for their exclusive use by a publishing concern. Congressman Macon of Arkansas has quoted Lieutenant Shackleton, General Greley, and others to show that 10 to 12 miles per day or slightly more perhaps, is considered the limit of human endurance, travelling over polar seas, Peary claimed that he made as much as 44 nautical miles a day or over 50 statute miles a day from the pole back to Bartlett's camp. Macon quoted a statement made by Peary himself to Greley in 1904, in which he said that 7.4 miles a day would be a good average.

LOCAL and OTHER ITEMS.

Advices from Yokohama, say that five hundred Japanese houses were destroyed by fire, and several lives were lost in the conflagration.

Mr. Robert N. McNeill, Barrister, Charlottetown, has been chosen the Liberal candidate for the Cardigan district.

More than forty-five persons were killed and almost as many more seriously injured in a wreck at Green Mountain Is., of two Rock Island trains.

The information reached the Great Western despatcher at Des Moines, Iowa, on the 21st, that fourteen people were killed and twenty four were injured in a wreck near Gladbrook.

A report has come to Victoria, B. C. from Uclulet, on the West Coast of Vancouver Island, that one of the Whaling Company's steamers has discovered what may prove to be the wreck of the Conestoga, a British whaler, lost with all hands in the winter of 1900. An investigation will be made.

David White, aged 56 a carpenter formerly of Murray River, P. E. I. was killed Friday in Roxbury Mass, by the collapse of a stage and Henry Gisors of Roxbury, was seriously injured. The men who were engaged as carpenters, rolled over the roof and dropped to the lawn thirty feet below as the stage fell.

On Palm Sunday, the blessing and distribution of the Palms in St. Dunstan's Cathedral took place immediately preceding the high mass at 10.30. Rev. Maurice McDonald officiated at the blessing and also sang the Mass. While the celebrant read the Passion at the altar. Rev. Dr. McLellan read the same in English in the pulpit.

Word reached Quebec City on Monday from New Castle that John Hall Kelley, M. P. for Bonaventure, had his hands and arms very badly burned while endeavoring to extinguish the flames caused by drapery in the mortuary chamber of the late father, whose death occurred on Saturday, catching fire. The fire threatened to consume the corpse.

A bottle crossed the Atlantic Ocean, at least 5,000 miles in six months, according to a letter found in the bottle and addressed "McMillan, Freeport, Me." The bottle was found near Kinsale at Queenstown, Ireland, on Saturday last and was cast overboard by Commander Peary, Sept. 2, 1909, on his return trip from the Pole, to ascertain the current of the tides off the Labrador coast.

A despatch to Winnipeg from Fort Resolution, Athabasca states that on Jan. 23 many Indians arrived from various points of the Great Slave Lake region. All had the same rate of suffering from lack of food. Caribou, the staple article of food is absent. Fish is the only product available and it is not too fresh as it was caught last September for dog's food.

Amid scenes of the wildest disorder in the House of Representatives, Washington, the Democrats assisted by insurgent Republicans on Saturday robbed Speaker Cannon of the chairmanship of the Rules Committee and had his name removed from the membership of that committee. A resolution introduced to remove him from the Speakership failed to carry and Cannon still occupies the chair.

A terrible tragedy occurred at Capetown, N. B. as a result of which Mrs. Esther Gallop is dead, and her brother Wm. Lewis, the innocent cause of her death, is crazed with grief. Mrs. Gallop was visiting at her brother's home. She was sitting in the kitchen while Mr. Lewis was examining a shot gun. Inadvertently he pulled the trigger. There was a crash and a shriek and the woman lay dead upon the floor the side of her head blown off by buckshot, the walls and ceiling being covered with blood and brains.

The death of Mr. Alexander McDonald (Dalry) of the Standard Oil Company, Cincinnati, Ohio, is announced from Long Beach, California, whither he had gone in ill health some time ago. Deceased was 76 years of age. Deceased was well known in this Province where he had spent his summers for the past ten years, in his mansion at Tracadie beach. His wife predeceased him by about four years. His only daughter is dead, but her two daughters, survive, and also one brother of the deceased residing in London.

Two hundred and twenty-five persons perished by shipwreck, and eighty-three vessels met disaster off the New England and British North American coasts during the fall and winter season which ended on March 21. Of eighty-three vessels cast ashore, thirteen were steamers, one was a full rigged ship, four were barks, three barkentines and sixty two were schooners. A number of barges were lost, but they were not included in the list. The financial loss aggregated \$1,000,000. This is what Boston advices of the 21. say.

The Lenten Sermon in the Cathedral on Sunday evening last was preached by Rev. Dr. McLellan. His theme was the Real Presence of our Lord in the Blessed Eucharist. His text was from the VI. chapter of the Gospel according to St. John, 56th, and other verses. It was an able and eloquent dissertation on the Real Presence. He quoted numerous passages from the New Testament, notably from St. John and the other Evangelists, as well as from St. Paul's Epistles to prove and confirm the meaning of Christ's words, when He instituted the Blessed Eucharist. He showed that, according to the usage of the time and the rules of interpretation, our Lord spoke in a literal sense when He announced this tremendous mystery. The discourse was a most logical knitting together of the Scriptural arguments proving his theme. It certainly was a very able sermon.
