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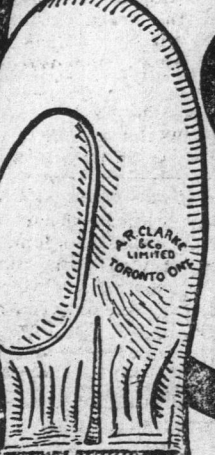

TERRIFIC WIND STORM DOES GREAT DAMAGE

To Shipping at Sydney, Nova Scotia—Several Schooners Driven Ashore—Electric Light Wire Down and City in Darkness.

Sydney, N.S., Oct. 1.—A terrific wind rain storm, which passed over this city last night, caused much damage to shipping and property. Electric wires were blown down and the city is in complete darkness. The death, caused as the result of a person coming in contact with a live wire. AUSTIN'S DEAD MAY BE BURNED

In Order to Prevent Spread of Disease Torch May Be Applied.

Austin, Pa., Oct. 2.—Twenty-four are dead and eight-six missing and are thought to be buried beneath the debris in the official census tonight of Austin's loss of life in the flood on Saturday. It seems however, that several strangers were in town that day and undoubtedly perished. Including allowances for inevitable errors in compilation, the total dead probably will reach 150. Twenty-one of the bodies recovered have been identified and the missing it is hoped that some may be accounted for. The problem tonight is to recover the dead from the thousands of tons of debris choking the narrow valley. To do so before it becomes necessary to burn the ruins and save the living from an epidemic, an army of laborers must reach the town within the next thirty-six hours. Officials say otherwise the torch may transform the wreckage into the pyre of most of those who have perished.

The single line of wire between Austin and the outside world carried an urgent plea for workmen to the masters of Buffalo, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia. Samuel G. Loxon, state commissioner of health, supreme in command at Austin, wired each of the mayors. "We are in need of laborers to assist in rescue work. We desire about 400 sent in a bunk train. Please advise what you can do. The work consists of recovering dead bodies from ruins. Please telegraph what assistance you can render," was the wire forwarded.

Encouraging responses are expected tomorrow. "Give us your dead," is Austin's cry, voiced by Senator Baldwin, who lost his father, mother, sister and other relatives. Only the body of his father, John E. Baldwin, had been recovered. The others are in the ruins.

"Give Us Our Dead," the Cry "I speak for the people of Austin," he said. "The state of Pennsylvania owns us the bodies of our loved ones. For forty-eight hours they have been in the ruins, how much longer will the commonwealth leave them there? The state should have men working here now."

The nine mile railroad line leading here, Kaituma summit was given over today to rescuers. The cars pulled out to the summit for the scene of the disaster. When they reached here, the workers decried; the drones were sent back. Every man on Austin's streets, except the newspapermen, were forced into service but despite the efforts of the authorities only 250 were working at sunset.

Fire Breaks Out. Smoldering flames in the debris burst out anew this afternoon, but it is not believed that any bodies were burnt. Austin stands to a man against the suggestion that it may be necessary to put the torch to the ruins. 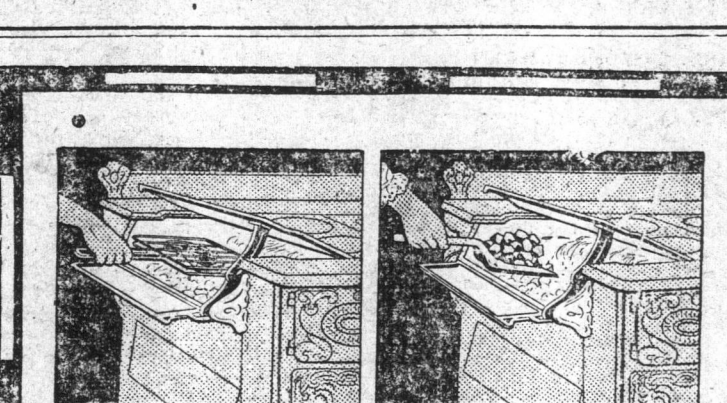

REMOSE THE RESTRICTION.

Another Serious Outbreak of Foot and Mouth Disease in England.

Ottawa, Oct. 3.—Owing to another serious outbreak of the foot and mouth disease in Somersetshire the restriction, which was removed last week on the importation from the old country of cattle, sheep and other ruminants and swine from the United Kingdom into Canada, has been reimposed. This order will affect a number of Canadian importers, some of whom have been for some time holding animals purchased in Great Britain in the hope of being able to bring them to Canada before the close of the present season.

SCHOOLS MAY CLOSE.

For Want of Coal, Board's Credit Being Exhausted.

Nelson, Oct. 2.—Unable to gain credit for coal, with no funds in the treasury, and with the city council determined to maintain its position and to refuse supplies unless compelled to do so by the courts, the Nelson school board is faced with the necessity of closing the public and night schools of the city.

This was the announcement made at a meeting of the school board to-night. The situation is the climax to a long-standing dispute between the city council and the board. Recently the school board appealed to the courts for a mandamus to compel the council to provide money to meet outstanding bills, but was met with refusal. The council contends that the board is extravagant, that it has exceeded its estimates, and that it has to the end of the week, when Nelson will be faced with a cessation of its educational institutions.
