HEREDITY.

Heredity is now much to the fore. Students of Eugenics are taking lessons from stock-raisers and nurserymen, and contemplating the breeding and nurture of steeds, short-horns and Southdowns, and the cross-fertilization of seed. Providentially brawn and form are not the only attributes considered desirable in man. Abstract attributes are not conveyed from father to son with the fidelity of a photograph, and these physical qualities are of at least as much importance as the physical features. Human nature plays a large part in the world, and here hereditary influence is at its lowest ebb. Yesterday the descendants of the great poets, so far as they could be dragged out of obscurity, were banqueted. The object, we presume, was to convince the world that poets are not born but made, and that there is no dynasty of Shakespeares with a Shakespeare X, rivalling in name the fame of the Elizabethan Shakespeare. In the Republic of Letters there is no hereditary peerage, and the son of a Peer of Poetry is but a commoner, indistinguishable from the common herd. Once divine right did hedge in a King by heredity, and heredity was the chief of the titles qualifying a man to be a law maker. A few days ago the world was treated to the spectacle of a House of hereditary Peers passing by a vote of 171 to 17, a resolution expressing their conviction that such a qualification by itself was an anachronism, venerable and august, but abandoned a pretension which it has maintained for many centuries, the world may begin to realize there are many traits which are not transmitted hereditarily. And fortunate it is. How could even America stand a dynasty of Theodores, if they hand-

ed down Rooseveltism from father to son. A second Barnum the world might stand, but not another Roosevelt. Otherwise, the world in self-defence would have to provide a lethal chamber to extinguish the brood to protect itself from the incessant annoyance arising from everlasting self-advertisement so characteristic a trait in Theodore the First.

Supreme Court.

Before Mr. Justice Johnson in Chambers.
In the matter of the petition of Harvey & Co. praying that Eli Mercer be declared insolvent. Mr. J. J. McGrath for the petitioners; C. E. Hunt, for Mercer; W. E. Wood for Thomas Smyth Co., Ltd. J. J. McGrath states the facts of the case of the petitioner, and calls Eli Mercer who is examined by J. J. McGrath. It is ordered that Mercer be declared insolvent, and that Herbert E. Brooks be continued as trustee, and that petitioner have costs paid out of the estate.

Escaped Death.

While Charles Davis, a teamster with C. Lester, was standing on the deck of the schooner Empyre, discharging sand ballast at Marshall Bros. wharf this morning, the gin gave out aloft as a tub of sand was being hoisted from the hold and came to the deck, scraping Davis by only a few inches. Rebounding it struck the man with great force in the head, knocking him down and inflicting three nasty cuts in his cranium. He was assisted to the firm's office store and Mr. George Marshall telephoned Dr. Cowperthwaite. He was quickly on the scene and inserted several stitches in the cuts. you in my letter, I thought I'd wait a few days.

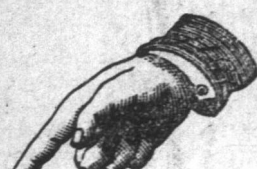
