## Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram.

OTTAWA, March 22.  
Replying to a question in the  
House of Commons to-day, Sir Wil-  
fred Laurier said: "The attention of  
the Government and the whole people  
of Canada could not fail to be attract-  
ed by the proposition now being dis-  
cussed by Sir Edward Grey and Pre-  
sident Taft for a Treaty of arbitration  
between Britain and the States, which  
would secure for their peoples the  
blessings of perpetual peace. Whilst  
the Government of Canada could have  
no direct voice in the negotiations, he  
satisfactorily asserted that there was no part  
of the British Empire where such  
would be more welcome than in Can-  
ada, which was so closely connected  
with the States, geographically, and  
by ever increasing trade regulations,  
but still more intimately connected  
with Britain by the strongest holds  
of devoted allegiance."

LONDON, March 22.  
Answering a question in the House  
of Commons to-day concerning the  
additional duty imposed by the United  
States on British spirits, Mr. Hob-  
house, Financial Secretary, said that  
in the opinion of the British Govern-  
ment the allowance made to exporters  
of spirits did not justify the increase  
of duty under the American tariff.  
The British Ambassador at  
Washington had been instructed to  
make representation to the United  
States Government in accordance with  
these views.

MELBOURNE, March 22.  
Seventeen native policemen, mem-  
bers of the party which accompanied  
Stanford Smith, the British Adminis-  
trator of Papua, New Guinea, on an  
expedition into the interior of that  
great island, have been drowned from  
rafts in the Strickland River. The  
expedition cut through 300 miles of  
jungle for five days, without food or  
fire. Smith was reported by mistake  
to have been murdered by natives.  
The discoveries made by him are said  
to be valuable.

The meeting opened with a hymn after  
which the Governor delivered an ad-  
dress on the introduction of Christian-  
ity into England. Rev. J. Thackeray  
then read the report for the past year:

financial statements. Addresses were  
delivered by Revs. J. Sutherland and  
J. W. Bartlett on the subject of the  
Bible and the work of the Bible So-  
cieties in its distribution. The officers

#### Patients for Hospital.

The Health authorities yesterday  
had the Fever Hospital ready for the  
diphtheria patients, and in all 21 suf-  
ferers from the disease were taken  
there including 13 from Mount Cashel,

the General Hospital and 2 from resi-  
dences in the city. The adminis-  
tration of anti-toxin proved to be a good  
preventive, for up to date no other  
boys at the orphanage have taken it;  
four have the disease, but the others  
are only in for observation and suffer  
mostly from sore throats. The apart-  
ments which they occupied at Mount  
Cashel were thoroughly fumigated

and disinfected yesterday, and the  
place will be released from quarantine  
to-day. The disease is of a mild type  
and some of the patients are already  
recovering.
