### Cyrrille Chartrand Sentenced.

Assault of Katie Marks Got Ten Years on Another Charge. A stiff sentence was imposed this morning on Cyrrille Chartrand, who has appeared in the courts on several serious charges of late, when he was sentenced to a term of ten years in prison on a charge of assault committed in the jail while Chartrand was awaiting sentence on a charge of having assaulted and attempted to kill Katie Marks, a young girl student, about a month ago. He has not been tried on the latter case, but will be up for voluntary statement next week. The second charge is considered of a much more serious nature, so it is presumed that Chartrand will have more than a few years in which to repent. He is not by any means a stranger to the police or to the jail authorities, as he has been several times imprisoned. On one occasion he served a term for impersonating a Protestant minister.

The assault on the child was one of the most cowardly and brutal crimes which has been committed in Montreal for a long while. The little one, while on her way to school, was met by Chartrand, who decoyed her to the basement of the institution (in which he was working), and attempted to assault her. The child screamed for help, when Chartrand opened the furnace door, and threatened to throw her into the flames. When help arrived the monster had fled, and the child was lying unconscious on the floor. Her hair and scalp were so badly burned that she has been unable to appear in court since.—Montreal Witness, Feb. 4.

### Another Mystery of The Silent Sea.

New Port News, Vt., Feb. 5.—Another mystery of the deep, practically paralleling the unexplained disappearance of the crew of the schooner Marie Celeste, several years ago, has come to port with the British tank steamer Roumanian. On Jan. 19, churning along ten days out from Port Arthur, and near the Azores she picked up the Norwegian bark Remittent, seaworthy, provisioned and fully rigged but without a soul on board, and no indication of the crew's fate. The Roumanian after towing the Remittent to within 100 miles of Cape Henry lost her in a violent gale. The Remittent was commanded by Captain Torgersen and she sailed from Rio Grande, Solsud, October 15, for Liverpool. She was 351 tons, a comparatively small ship and probably carried in addition to her master a crew of five or six.

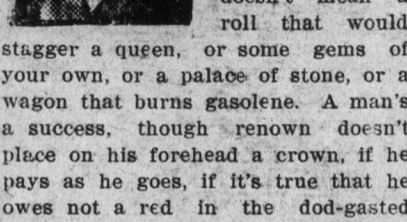
### Mule's Kick Worth \$3,865.

### Thorpe For The Giants.

Carlisle Indian to Receive over \$5,000 Salary.  
New York, Feb. 1.—With the signature to-day of a contract to join the New York National League Baseball Club, Jas. Thorpe, the Carlisle Indian, is grabbed up by Manager McGaw, of the New York Giants at a salary reported to be over \$5,000 with only an ordinary record behind him of ability as a ball player. McGaw never saw Thorpe play ball. He will make a valuable acquisition to major league baseball. McGaw, who pays little attention to averages, is certain that the Indian has the makings of a great ball player. Thorpe played in the south as a pitcher, outfielder and first baseman. In the box, he won a few more games than he lost, and in in-fielding he had a per centage of over 900. He was not a scientific batter, swinging at the ball freely and not being satisfied unless he hit it out of the lot. His average, however, was over 250. He was regarded as a wonderful thrower, and a speedy base runner.

### Cable News.

LONDON, Feb. 11. Despatches give details of the Antarctic tragedy. Capt. Oates evidently set out from the tent in which his four companions had all but succumbed to starvation and exhaustion, to brave death alone in the blizzard which had overwhelmed them. After a brave struggle of weeks, his hands frostbitten, Oates declared to his comrades that he was going to set out in the storm, but did not know when he would come back. He left the tent as was never seen again. The others, later, tried to push on, but were forced into camp again on March 21, after nine days' struggle with the blizzard. Food and fuel were alike exhausted. Probably realizing that his party were doomed, Captain Scott entered in his diary, four days later, on March 25th, a message to the public. In this he declared that disaster was not due to lack of organization, but to misfortune. He said nobody in the world could expect successfully to encounter such temperature and storms as they had met, and which had so retarded their progress. When they arrived within 11 miles of the depot they had only fuel enough for one hot meal and food for two days. The doomed explorer wrote apologetically his rough notes. He said that these and their bodies must tell the tale. He appealed to his countrymen to care for those depending on the perishing explorers.

LONDON, Feb. 11. According to special despatches, the Terra Nova Relief Party, which found the bodies, read a simple ritual and erected a cairn over them. They then set out to search for the body of Captain Oates, but, although they covered over twenty miles, discovered no trace of it. It was with great difficulty they brought back all of the records, including Raoul Amundsen's letter to the King of Norway, and a large quantity of geological specimens. March 25th, 1912, was the date of Capt. Scott's last message, and it is believed it was written only four days before death overtook the party.

BERLIN, Feb. 11. Dr. Friedmann has decided to sail for New York from Bremen, on the Kronprinzessin Cecilie on Feb. 18th. He returned to Berlin to-day, saying that he had been to Frankfurt-on-the-Main, where he had handed over his remedy for Tuberculosis to Dr. Paul Ehrlich, who will make experiments with it at the Government Institute for Experimental Therapeutics at that place.

TOKIO, Feb. 11. Rioting continued until the early hours this morning, when the mobs dispersed owing to intense cold, and a lack of further object on which to vent their fury. At noon to-day the patriots and soldiers were withdrawn from the streets. Prince Taro Katsura, the Premier, and the members of his Cabinet, who had assembled at the Premier's official residence at 10 o'clock last evening, remained in session till this morning. The building being strongly guarded. The Council of Elder Statesmen was called together at the Palace this afternoon. Statements made in well-informed circles lead to the belief that Katsura and his colleagues will resign. Count Kombe Yamamoto, formerly Minister of Marine, has signified his willingness to accept the Premiership, together with the leadership of the old Constitutional Party, of which Marquis Sarouji is now the chief. Prince Katsura will, in the meantime, proceed with the organization of his proposed new party.

SOPIA, Feb. 11. The Turkish Army in the Gallipoli peninsula, lost between 5,000 and 6,000 men, and 50 officers, during the fighting at Bulair. Several thousand Turkish soldiers have fallen in a battle before the Tchatalja lines on Feb. 9th, and thousands more at Charkeui, southeast of Rodosto. Report says that the Bulgarian army, having repulsed several Turkish attacks along Tchatalja lines, except on the extreme right flank, where they were exposed to a convergent fire from the Turkish warships in the Sea of Marmora and the Gulf of Buzuk. Cherkweje, retired to fresh positions, five or six miles in the rear. Large bodies of men have been sent out to clear the field of battle of the Turkish dead bodies, which number over 5,000. It is believed that the number of Turkish wounded must be more than double as great. Turkish warships shelled the Bulgarian line flank all day, but only killed one, and slightly wounded another. Bulgarian soldiers the Bulgarian losses, were insignificant.
