Brigus Visited by Fire.

The meetings at the S. A. Citadel, New Gower Street, yesterday, were of more than ordinary interest and were very largely attended. At the eleven o'clock service Adjutant Brigg of Bonavista, was in charge and preached a most fitting and useful sermon from the text: "Thus saith the Lord our Saviour, in all things." At 7 o'clock the service took the form of a memorial to the late William Moore. A number of the soldiers spoke, all testifying to the exemplary life of their promoted comrade.

Mr. C. H. Hutchings, Deputy Minister of Justice, received a message Saturday evening intimating that a serious fire broke out in the Jubilee Hall, Brigus, at 1.45 p.m. and fanned by the high wind that prevailed, looked as if it would get beyond control and sweep the settlement. As soon as an alarm was raised volunteers gave yeoman help and after a few hours of desperate fighting, controlled the flames. The hall was considerably damaged.

Tug Here Short of Coal

Had to Leave Her Tow 150 Miles off This Port.

The tug Black Cock, of Liverpool, arrived here yesterday morning reporting to be short of coal, and having to abandon the S. S. St. George which she was towing from Liverpool to Halifax, about 150 miles off this port. Both ships were out about 15 days when they ran short of coal and St. John's being the nearest port the captain of the tug decided to come here and replenish the bunkers. When the tug left her tow it was decided between them that the Black Cock would return and pick the ship up. The tug took 100 tons of coal, and after the arrival of the Kyle here yesterday the berth interested asked, Mr. Reid to send her away with the tug to try and pick up the St. George. The Kyle reported last evening to Cape Race that she was in communication with the ship and hoped to pick her up with the tug to-day. The St. George is a new and large ferry boat owned by the C.P.R., recently built and was being towed long by the Black Cock which is a ship of the Liverpool Tug-boat Co.

Foreign Fish Market.

Appended is a letter received from Oporto: "There is no change in report in the condition of our market. The demand for British fish is not so good as it should be, although our own sales have been better lately. Prices have fallen a little and we are therefore losing no opportunity of sale. Parcels of old cure are still arriving and it is to be hoped that this quality will be sold before the new begins to arrive in any quantity as dealers are only buying what they need for their daily requirements. We received a parcel of new cure about a fortnight ago, which we sold immediately at magnificent prices. The first cargo of spring cure should obtain very good prices. The schooner R. Fabricius arrived on the 27th ult."

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. BIRLEBY, July 27.

Private Hawkins, of Toronto, on Saturday won the King's prizes for rifle shooting, carrying with it the National Rifle Association's gold medal, gold badge and \$1,250 in cash.

ROCHESTER, N.Y., July 27. A fire on Saturday did \$30,000 damage to the plant of the Union and Advertiser afternoon newspaper. This was the fourth fire in two weeks in the same building.

LONDON, July 27. A despatch to the Daily Express from Rome, says that the Powers have authorized Russia to occupy Armenia, in order to compel Turkey to withdraw behind the Enos-Midia frontier, as fixed by the Treaty of London.

LONDON, July 27. On conclusion of the naval manoeuvres, a powerful squadron of armored ships will leave for the West Indies to remain in these waters. The force will be based at Bermuda, the ships returning to England in the summer only to participate in the annual naval exercises. This development is thought to be associated with the opening of the Panama Canal next year.

BIRMINGHAM, Alabama, July 27. Donald Kenny, a chauffeur, and Christopher Gustin, iron moulder, were killed to-night by an electric shock in the local hall of the Loyal Order of Moose. An initiation was in progress, and it is said that the electric shock was a part of the ceremony. In some way, not yet explained, Kenny and Gustin received too much current.

LONDON, July 27. Members of the Imperial Cadet Corps, selected by Lord Roberts to represent the Mother Country as guests of the Dominion Government, leave Liverpool to-day by the Empress of Britain. The Cadets will attend the annual meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association, during August, at Ottawa, and will afterwards proceed to the Militia training camp at Petawawa.

PARIS, July 27. A telegram from Saloniki says the Greeks occupied Xanthi, on Saturday, and that all the inhabitants including Americans and Englishmen, are believed to have been massacred by the Bulgarians. Seventy-four foreigners are said to have been put to death. Twenty thousand Greeks, Mussulmans and Jews are reported to have perished in a town which was afterwards pillaged by the retreating Bulgarians. No confirmation of the reported massacre has been received from any other source.

OTTAWA, July 27. It is definitely known here that the Panama Canal tolls question will be submitted to arbitration at the Hague. It is expected a British, Canadian and German commissioner will be chosen to sit with the international tribunal. Chief Justice Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, who is now a member of the Hague Tribunal adjusting financial claims between Canada and the States, may be Canada's choice. Solicitor General Arthur Meighan will assist in preparing Canada's case.

SHANGHAI, July 27. Fighting was resumed last night. After fruitless negotiations for an armistice, the Southerners withdrew at daylight. Their attack was again unsuccessful. The Consular body is considering expelling Dr. Sun Yat Sen, General Huang Sing, and General Chan Chi Nel, who are conducting the revolution from the safety of foreign settlements. It is estimated that there are 100,000 Chinese refugees in these settlements, and many are arriving at other ports. The casualties of Southerners around Shanghai number 1,200; the losses of the Northerners are much less.

The Regatta.

The Logy Bay fishermen had their first spin Saturday evening. The amateur race promises to be of more than ordinary interest. Five crews are practicing hard. All are evenly matched and it is doubtful as to who will win. There is also a considerable lot of enthusiasm centred in the Brigade Race. Between the C. L. B., G. C. C. and Highlanders a close contest is expected by their supporters. However many are in the hope that the Hr. Grace Brigade boys, who will have their first spin this evening in the Shamrock, will make a good fight for first place. It is conjectured that the quickest time on Regatta Day will be made in the Laborers race.
