He said this: "During the construc-tion of the road the men have obtained only a miserable living, with greater exposure and greater toil than their fellow-fishermen have been called upon to endure. Out early i the morning and home late at night, forced to pay high prices for provisions with other incidental charges and with no time allowance except when their backs have been bent and their brows bathed in perspiration, toiling along with pick and shovel the railway laborers have worked harder and profited less than the fish-ermen of the Colony."
