The Tables Are Turned!

Kilbride Bids Loyal Welcome to Liberal Standard-Bearers.

The People of That Historic Settlement Unite With other Sections of St. John's West and Acclaim Ellis, Cowan and Scott their Future Representatives.

The historic settlement of Kilbride, which was looked upon, particularly by the Big Chief, as the strongest Tory settlement in the country, has decided to hold the Liberal banner which was lowered for four and a half years. This was plainly demonstrated last night at the meeting held by Messrs. Ellis, Cowan and Scott, the Liberal standard-bearers. The enthusiasm was wonderful, as during the course of two hours tumultuous cheering, which could be heard for a great distance, rent the air for Sir Robert Bond, Ellis, Cowan and Scott and the Liberal Party.

The meeting opened at 8.30 in the house of Mr. Michael Ryan. On motion being made Mr. Edward Connolly—the oldest voter of Kilbride—was appointed chairman and with a usual tact filled that post to perfection. The first speaker introduced was Mayor Ellis, who reviewed the policies of both leaders. He convincingly showed that the policy of Sir Robert Bond was a progressive one and that of Sir Edward Morris, one of recklessness, as the unscrupulous spending of an enormous amount of the people's money during the past four years amply demonstrated. He referred to the two occasions when the Colony was in grave financial difficulties and when Sir Robert Bond was selected to go abroad to get a loan and which he successfully raised after pledging his own money to pay the interest.

Mr. John Scott followed and effectively showed up the misdoings of the Tory Government, showing the squander that existed particularly on the railways and agricultural scheme or "South-Sea Bubble." He also dwelt on the catch cries of the Tory organs in an endeavour to influence the electorate so as the Liberal Party could get another term of office which if it occurred would mean ruin and financial disaster for the country. In conclusion the speaker paid a well merited tribute to the P. U. U. which was one of the best concerns ever inaugurated in this country.

Mr. H. E. Cowan on rising to speak was heartily applauded. He eloquently portrayed the doings of the Tory Government since they came to power, and how the Tory Chief after being four years in office and on the eve of a general election meets a death-bed repentance and put sugar and tea on the free list to serve as an election kite. Mr. Cowan expressed himself as glad to see the people of Kilbride falling into line with other parts of the district and supporting the one and only true party led by
