Our Coal Measures

AND MR. DUNSTAN'S VISIT.

Yesterday the Premier tabled the correspondence relating to the proposed visit of Prof. Dunstan to Newfoundland.

The gist of the correspondence is contained in a letter addressed by the Governor to the Secretary of State for the Colonies. Professor Dunstan was invited to visit Newfoundland in the fall of last year, but was unable to come owing to an engagement in Ceylon. He will be able to come next summer. The object of his visit is to advise the Government, in collaboration with Mr. Howley, "on the value of the coal measures which have been found in the neighborhood of St. George's Bay," and to give advice as to the development of our oil shales, copper, lead and antimony.

Professor Dunstan is the Director of the Imperial Institute and holds enquiries in collaboration with the authorities of the Crown Colonies for the Institute, which is conducted in connection with the Colonial Office.

The correspondence fully bears out the remarks made by the Opposition as to the objects of Mr. Dunstan's visit.

We in no way oppose the visit. We welcome it. It may do considerable good and may be the means of inducing capitalists to take up the work of exploration, particularly of our coal deposits, with a view to turning them to industrial use.

Mr. Dunstan has made reports on the coal resources of India and Rhodesia, but it should be borne in mind that he is not coming here to conduct coal boring and such exploration work. He is coming to see what Mr. Howley can show him and to examine Mr. Howley's records and then to tell the Government what he thinks about the commercial possibilities and we presume to make a report of his own for the Bulletin of the Imperial Institute, which is issued quarterly, and contains summaries of reports on the resources of different Crown Colonies and Protectorates.

Be Cautious With "Canny."

Probably there is only one word in the English language, which, complimentary to one person, by another person living a dozen miles away, would be taken as something of an insult.

This is the word "canny," which, in the localities where it is used—viz., Scotland and the North of England, has a separate and quite distinct meaning and significance.

In Scotland the word is usually understood to denote prudence, cautiousness, and a certain intelligent capacity for looking after one's own interests. But in Durham and Northumberland the word is used to express kindness, goodness, and affectionate regard. To a Northumbrian "canny body" sums up all that is kind and lovable in a man or woman, just as the term "canny Newscaster" expresses the Novocastrian's affection for his native city.

Curiously enough, on the borders of Yorkshire, and to some extent in Cumberland, the natives place the Scottish interpretation on the word more often than the English one. Consequently, in these localities it is not always safe to advance "canny" as a compliment.

Keeper of Deer Park
Gored to Death by Maddened Deer—Aged Man Made Terrible Struggle for Life.

Probably there is only one word in with a herd of weather-maddened deer, led by a huge antlered buck, Patrick Horan, a keeper in the deer park on the edge of Edwin Hawley's estate at West Islop, was gored to death yesterday. No one saw the battle, but a blood-stained pitchfork, a broken club, ground torn up for many rods and blood-dripping wounds on the deer themselves were mute witnesses to the terrible struggle the aged man put up for his life.

By the side of Horan's body was the pitchfork with which he had evidently done yeoman service. Near that was a cane he usually carried, broken in two evidently by the hoofs of one of the animals.

Horan's body was so cut up by the hoofs and antlers that he could scarcely be recognized. It was plain that the buck had led his mates in jumping on the old man after they had rushed him and got him down. Evidence of the fight were shown half way across the pen, showing that the keeper had gone in, seen the deer were vicious and turned to get out fighting off the animals with the pitchfork.
