## Volunteers All.

The Kaiser has worked wonders with the British Empire. He quelled the noise of armed faction at home, and has caused the whole Empire to rise with one voice and spirit against him. The discordant clashing as to how Canada should help the homeland that has been heard for some years past, has been changed into strenuous effort to offer their best in men and money and strife has ceased as to the method of doing it. Thanks to the Kaiser. In South Africa, Premier Botha who was the most formidable general we had against us in the Boer War is now foremost in welding South Africa solid to help the Empire. The talk of secession and trouble in India in vogue some years ago has now changed into one grand chorus of offers of men, money and treasure to help the King fight the Kaiser. No greater tribute to any Emperor has ever been paid by a people than is told in the despatch received by the Governor from the Secretary of the Colonies. At home where a regular army of some 170,000 men is usually kept, nearly half a million men have enlisted in this same regular army and before long another half million will swell the Regular Army to 1,200,000 men. Before the winter is over, if the war last so long, the Kaiser may find Austria crippled and out of the fight, the Russian millions pressing him in the East, and the armies of France and Belgium, swelled by a million and a quarter British troops. The remarkable feature of this effort in the British Empire is that it is absolutely voluntary. India's offer of men and money is the free will offering of a thousand or more princes. Leaders and great men of India, backed by the willing assent of the hundreds of millions in that bright gem of the Crown. All the offers of the Dominion have also been purely voluntary and every man who has enlisted is a volunteer. It will take time to get these great armies in working order, and so long as the allies can keep their armies at the front intact, and avoid great disasters like Sedan and Metz, there will be a continually increasing and growing army to meet the Germans who must from week to week become more and more exhausted under the strain of continual fighting on both frontiers. So far the general news is good.

## Fishery Improving.

### BRINGS ENCOURAGING NEWS.

The S.S. Kyle, Capt. Parsons, arrived from the Labrador Service at 10 a.m. to-day, having made all the ports of call to Nain, going and returning. Capt. Parsons reports a decided improvement in the fishery in the extreme North, which report is based on information received from the captain of the Baleine, now plying in the Northern Service.

From Daw's Island to Queen's Lakes the vessels are all loaded. These are vessels from the Bonavista fleet, all of whom have fares ranging from 1,000 quintals down. Many of the smaller vessels are filled below decks and are "sailing in" bulks on deck.

From Sedit Bay north very little has been done. The Twillingate fleet which are operating principally from Musford Tickle have average fares. The "stationers" along the coast have all done well, and though the voyage is not yet over the average catch is from 400 to 500 quintals. From Grady to Black Island there has been little or no improvement since last report. The Kyle, brought 250 casks of whale oil from the Hawke's Bay station, which she is discharging at Harvey & Co's premises.

## Our Regiment.

Several more young men joined the Regimental Camp at Pleasantville yesterday morning, and were added to the large number already under canvas. Drilling goes on regularly, while a contingent under Major G. T. Carthy and Capt. Goodridge went for a tramp towards Logy Bay before dinner. In the afternoon the whole regiment was reviewed by Major Franklin and Adj. W. P. Rendell on the Parade Ground, who were pleased with the progress made. Ranks were then reformed and the volunteers to the number of about 300 went on a long march countrywards under Capt. L. C. Murphy. During the evening those in camp were treated to a very interesting resume of the allies' operations by Dr. Burke.

## Whaler Cachelot Doing Well.

According to reports brought from the northward by the S. S. Kyle, which arrived in port to-day, the whaler Cachelot, operating from Hawke's Bay will make a record voyage this year. Already she has 36 whales ashore to date and the Kyle was at that station they were averaging two whales per day. Operations on that coast do not usually close until November, and if the whales remain the Cachelot will have a big voyage to her credit.

POOR SHORE FISHERY.—From passengers who arrived in the city from the South West Coast last night we learn that the Shore fishery in that section has been almost a blank since the trapping season closed. The failure in due principally to lack of squid which have been unusually late in coming to land this year. At Berlin during the past week squid were fairly plentiful, and several vessels that were delayed in port for weeks secured a supply of bait, and sailed for the fishery grounds.

## Money in Plays.

Fortunes Which Authors Have Taken From Their Dramas.

The famous melo-drama "The Silver King", which was played recently at His Majesty Theatre before a royal audience in the cause of charity, has established several reputations and made fortunes for a number of people. The name of Wilson Barrett, of course, will always be associated with "The Silver King." The famous actor made a big fortune out of the play, which however, he ultimately lost in other disastrous theatrical speculations. But fortune smiled on him again when "The Sign of the Cross," which not only enabled him to pay his debts which amounted to some \$200,000 when he went to the States but also enabled him to leave \$150,000 when he died.

Referring again to "The Silver King," it is interesting to note that the play definitely decided Mr. Henry Arthur Jones, the collaborator with Henry Herman in the authorship, to devote himself to drama. "The Silver King" was only Mr. Jones, second attempt at playwriting, and more than once he has admitted that all his family and other expenses, trips abroad, etc., have been paid right up to the present out of the play. Herman, too, made a fortune out of the play, which, however, he lost through somewhat extravagant living and he subsequently sold his half of the play, a perfect gold mine, for \$3,500.

It is doubtful, however, if any play has made so much money as the still-running "Charley's Aunt." During the performance of this famous farce at the Globe and Royalty Theatres, it earned \$1,000,000 for the late Mr. Penley alone, and he had to share the profits with two others, while it is estimated that Mr. Brandon Thomas must have made \$300,000 out of the play.

"The Private Secretary," adapted from the German by Mr. Charles Hawtrey, brought that gentleman \$175,000 at least during its first run at the Globe and its tours. Mr. Hawtrey also made a fortune out of "A Message from Mars," which the author, Mr. Richard Ganthony, sold outright for \$40,000.

Mr. Edward Knoblauch's wonderful play "Kismet," in which Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Asche have scored such a brilliant success is estimated to have added \$200,000 to the banking account of the famous actor and his wife, while Mr. Jerome K. Jerome's highly-successful production, "The Passing of the Third Floor Back," has earned for Sir J. Forbes Robertson something like \$300,000.

"The Walls of Jericho," enriched Mr. Alfred Suto to the extent of \$275,000, while "The Little Minister" earned Sir J. M. Barrie \$20,000 a week for a number of years, and long before the curtain fell on the last performance at the Haymarket, the net profits had reached \$500,000. Then there was such plays as "Quality Street," "Peter Pan," and "The Admirable Crichton," which are scarcely surprising to learn have increased Sir J. M. Barrie's bank balance by over \$500,000.

Turning to musical comedy, Mr. Gilbert, who has composed the music for "The Joy-Ride Lady," at present running at the Garrick Theatre, confesses that his income for some years past has been at least \$15,000 a month. He has broken the world's record by writing eleven successful comic operas within five years. He has been even more successful than Herr Franz Lehar, who has fascinated us with the ear-haunting melodies in "The Merry Widow," which play must have brought him over \$1,500,000.
