Resources of the Allies

In a recent speech Mr. Lloyd George expressing his confidence in the success of the allies said: "The natural resources of the Allied countries are overwhelmingly greater than those of their enemies (1) in men capable of bearing arms, (2) in the financial and economic resources of these countries, and (3) in their accessibility to the markets of the world through the command of the sea for obtaining material and munitions." The proof of the first statement is to be seen in the powerful army which has enabled Russia to put herself on the offensive from the Baltic to Roumania, the millions of men for Kitchener's army; and the millions of Frenchmen under arms in France. The proof of the second statement is the case with which Britain has raised loans for the war, and in the fact that for the past twelve months, nine of which are war months, the revenue received by Lloyd George is \$142,500,000 greater than the revenue for the previous year. It is also to be seen in the fact that the Canadian loan of \$25,000,000, floated with the assent of the British Exchequer, for the purpose of payments of national indebtedness for the carrying on of works under construction and contract in Canada has been over-subscribed in London. The proof of the third statement is that there is no regular warships at large on any of the oceans and that there is only one converted German cruiser loose in the South Atlantic and that in spite of the losses of a number of small steamers in British and French waters, sea traffic is going on without interruption. Of the threatened raid by an overwhelming fleet of airships of London and other cities, which has been postponed many times since September 9, and which was declared eventually to be an Easter Sunday fixture, there is no news so far to hand of even an attempt at a raid being made yesterday. So much then for our material resources and German threats, but as Lloyd George puts it, there is a greater reason than these for full reliance on a successful outcome of the war for our arms, and "that is the moral strength of our cause that consists in a struggle which involves sacrifices, suffering and privation for all those engaged in it. A nation cannot endure to the end that has on its soul the crime of Belgium."

ITALY FILLS GRANARIES.

New York, March 28.—Italy took more than one-third of the total amount of wheat exported from New York—1,003,430 bushels—in the ten days from March 11 to 20. The total exports were greater than for the corresponding ten days of February, the figures being 3,091,526 bushels, 2,577,886.

Italy's taking of four were next to the largest of any nation that bought here. She took 105,368 bags out of a total of 575,000. In the corresponding ten days of February Italy took only 1,550 bags.

Next to Italy the Netherlands was the largest taker of wheat, the amount being 838,698 bushels. The Netherlands took the largest amount of flour, 263,440 bags. Denmark was the largest taker of corn and barley.

LATEST**From the Front.****11.00 A.M.****TURKISH CRUISER SUNK.**

LONDON, To-Day. Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent says: "A Berlin despatch received here states the Turkish headquarters reports that the Turkish fleet yesterday was near Odessa and that the cruiser Medjidieh, while pursuing the enemy with mine sweepers in the vicinity of the fortress of Ochakov, struck a drifting mine and sank. The crew were saved by Turkish warships. The cruiser Medjidieh, before the ship sank, removed the breech locks of guns and the torpedoes. The cruiser Prehnuter is being refloated by the Russians."

JAP-CHINESE TROUBLE SETTLED.

PARIS, To-Day. "A despatch to the Temps from Petrograd says: 'The China-Japanese negotiations, according to reliable information, have been concluded. The Chinese Government agrees to extend the Port Arthur lease for 99 years. It recognizes also that Japan has all the rights in Shantung previously belonging to Germany, and conditions are laid down that Germany shall never have the right to acquire colonies or spheres of influence in China.'"

AUSTRIANS LOSE AMMUNITION SHIP.

LONDON, To-Day. A despatch from Malmo, Sweden, asserts that two German coasting steamers during the last few days have struck floating mines and been sunk in the Baltic Sea. An official communication issued here says the Austrian ammunition ship Belgrade sank in the Danube, opposite Rutenok, on March 30. An explosion was caused aboard the Belgrade by Serbian gun fire. Out of a crew of forty only two were saved.

FEARED LOST WITH ALL ABOARD.

NEW YORK, To-Day. Fears that the steamer Prinz Mauritz, Royal Dutch West Indies Company, had gone down, possibly with all on board, were expressed last night in a wireless message received from the steamer Algonquin, which yesterday went to the aid of the Prinz Mauritz, reported in distress off Cape Hatteras.

2.00 P. M.**BULGARIAN IRREGULARS ATTACK GREEK TOWNS.**

LONDON, To-Day. A despatch from Salonika says the Bulgarian irregulars, who were driven back from the Serbian border, later descended upon the Greek town of Pofran, about thirty-five miles north of Salonika, and Greece is rushing reinforcements thither and to other frontier points, preparing for any event. Another band of Bulgarian irregular troops which tried to cross the Greek front were dispersed with the aid of machine guns. They left a number of dead and wounded on the field. It is alleged that in the Serbian villages through which they passed they committed atrocious atrocities. The Serbian frontier guards have now been armed with field guns and machine guns.

DAMAGE DONE BY BRITISH AVIATORS.

LONDON, To-Day. A French official communication this afternoon says: "The military authorities have received precise information regarding the results of the bombardment carried on by English aviators in Belgium, on the 28th March last. The results are as follows: The dirigible hangar at Berghen, Stagathe, was seriously damaged as well as the dirigible which it sheltered. At Hoboken, Antwerp, the naval construction shipyard was gutted, two German submarines damaged, forty Ger-

man workmen killed and sixty-two wounded.

GOEBEN STRUCK MINE.

LONDON, To-Day. A Salonika despatch says: "Refugees from Constantinople confirm the report that the cruiser Goeben, formerly of the German navy, but now a Turkish warship, was badly damaged by striking a mine in the Bosphorus and returned to her dock with a seventeen foot hole, which the German workmen have not been able to repair properly, on account of lack of steel plates. They filled the hole with 250 tons of concrete but this cracked on the first trial. Refugees deny the story that the Goeben's guns have been dismantled."
