## LATEST From the Front.

Messages Received  
Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFICIAL.  
LONDON, Aug. 7.  
The Governor, Newfoundland:  
The French Government report unsuccessful German attacks on the Heights of the Meuse, and bomb fighting at other points.  
The Russian Government report the Germans repulsed in the Baltic provinces, also further desperate fighting on the Narw and some retirement between the Vistula and Bug, where the enemy concentrated massed artillery.  
The Italian Government report some progress on Carso.

LONDON BUDGET.

LONDON, Aug. 8.  
The Germans continue to make progress. Their efforts are to cut off the retreat of the Russian army from the Polish salient. They have commenced an attack on the fortresses of Kovno and Ossowetz, which are among the objects they must overcome in order to reach the railway running from Warsaw through Vilna and Dnestro to Petrograd. They have taken the minor fortress of Serok at the junction of the Narw and Bug, and have crossed the Vistula in the vicinity of Warsaw. Further south General Woych is advancing eastward, but Field Marshal Mackensen is being stubbornly resisted, apparently making, at best, very slow progress. On the whole the daring scheme mapped out by the Germans as the grand sequel to the capture of Warsaw is unfolding itself slowly as must be the case from its very magnitude. With three main ways, besides those built since the war, it is believed in military circles here that the Grand Duke Nicholas will be able to extricate his Warsaw army. Events in the east, however, will continue to rivet the attention of the world on them for some time to come.

The Germans have gained minor successes in the Argonne forest, where the Army of the Crown Prince has been trying for some weeks to find a weak spot in the French defences, but their effort to recover lost trenches on Lingkopf in the Vosges, is declared to have cost them dearly.

There has been some rather heavy fighting in the Caucasus between the Russians and Turks, but official reports from the opposing camps are so contradictory that it is impossible to say in whose favor it is going. There is much interest in the diplomatic negotiations in the Balkan capitals, reports from which indicate that Serbia at last is willing to cede Macedonia to Bulgaria, but that the Greek Government is now opposing any suggestion of special cession of Saloniki to Bulgaria. It is thought, however, that the Venizelos offer to cede Kavala to Bulgaria when he was Premier, simply in return for continued neutrality, while Greece went to the assistance of the Allies against the Turks, but King Constantine put his foot down on the whole policy and the political crisis, which resulted in the resignation of the Venizelos Cabinet, followed.

The Petrograd Bourse Gazette publishes a statement to the effect that Germany had made peace proposals to Russia, but that they were rejected. There is no confirmation of this statement.

ROVNO EVACUATED.

LONDON, Aug. 8.  
A despatch from Copenhagen, says that the Russians are evacuating Rovno. The Governor and his staff and the banks have gone. The population has been leaving for the past week. Kovno is a fortress of the first class, and the capital of the government of the same name in North-west Russia.

RUSSIAN REPORT.

PETROGRAD, Aug. 8.  
In the direction of Riga we dislodge the enemy from the region between Dwina Ekan and the lower course of Asa. Fighting continues as before, without any essential change, on the roads east of Poniwesch. The enemy attacks on Kovno and Ossowetz which were repulsed on the 6th, were not renewed the following day. The enemy continues to deliver vigorous attacks from the Narw line along the whole frontier. Greater forces of the enemy are being directed against Lomza and Ostrov. On the right bank the 7th and 8th, without any engagement of importance. On the left bank, at Vierz, there have been rear-guard actions. In the course of counter attacks we captured some hundreds of prisoners. Between Vierz and the Bug there has been no change. On the left bank of the Bug between Toura and Louza we exercised pressure on the ene-

HYDROPLANES ESCAPE.

PARIS, Aug. 8.  
A note made public by the War Office to-night, says: The Germans endeavored to-day to destroy, off Neuport, by means of heavy shells, two Allied hydroplanes. Our artillery promptly silenced the German batteries. Of the two planes, one came back unscathed, while the other was towed into shore undamaged.

GERMAN TROOPS MET WITH JOY-  
OUS RECEPTION.

BERLIN, Aug. 8.  
German troops were welcomed to undamaged Warsaw as liberators, according to a report forwarded to Berlin by Karl M. Aral, special correspondent of the Lokal Anzeiger. Telegraphing under date August 5th, Aral places emphasis on the statement that the city was not evacuated without conflict. The forts were protected by barbed wire trenches, pitfalls and mines against infantry attacks. The city is not mentioned as having been damaged. The inhabitants of the Polish capital, filled with enthusiasm and of rejoicing, the streets were richly beflagged. The Polish peasants who long ago had been restrained in the city, began leaving early in the morning for their farms, driving live stock, conveying household effects. They greeted the

LONDON, Aug. 8.  
Lloyds announces that the British steamer Glenariff, of 1,000 tons, the Swedish steamer Malmard, and the traveler Ocean Queen have been sunk. The crews of all three vessels have been landed. The Glenariff was a vessel of 1,000 tons, owned by the Antrim Iron Ore Co., Belfast. The Malmard was 3,779 tons, owned at Gothenburg.

FISHING BOATS SUNK.

LONDON, Aug. 8.  
The British fishing smacks Hesperus, Ivanhoe and Fishermen have been sunk, presumably by German submarines. The crews were landed.

PULLED OFF THE ROCKS.

SYDNEY, N.S., Aug. 8.  
The steamer Kenora was pulled off the rocks at Low Point on Saturday night.

PORTUGAL'S PRESIDENT.

LISBON, Aug. 8.  
Bernardino Machado was elected by Congress to-day President of the Republic of Portugal. He is strongly pro-British.

Lieutenant in the navy is "Esq. R.N."
