Forty Greatest Inventions.

(from the Scientific American.)
Forty greatest inventions of times are credited to six—America, Great Britain, Germany, Italy and Norway. They are attributed to one in their entirety, but a few

are laid to two nations jointly. Great Britain is credited with being responsible for the steam engine, the Bessemer process; analine dyes, the steam turbine, the locomotive, the hot blast for the blast furnaces, the spinning jenny, half of the open-hearth process, the cyanide process, the rotary printing press, and half of the regenerative furnace, the gas engine, the Diesel motor, the by-product coke oven, and the X-ray. France is hailed as the home of photography, the Jacquard loom, artificial refrigeration, and parts of the development of the open-hearth process and of aluminum. Italy, of course, is credited with wireless, and Norway with half of the work necessary to develop the fixation of nitrogen. Then comes the American list, starting with the cotton gin, the reaper, telegraphy, vulcanized rubber, the sewing machine, the air-brake, the telephone, the incandescent light, half the work of aluminum, the induction motor, the airplane, the kinetoscope (foundation of the moving picture industry), the linotype, the steamboat, electric welding, high-speed steel, half the labor in connection with the fixation of nitrogen, the typewriter, the phonograph, the trolley car, and the Cottrell precipitation process.

British Morale.

Into the merits of the dispute between Lord French and Mr. Asquith, as to the shortage of shells in 1915, this is not the place to enter. Unhappily it has involved the name of Lord Kitchener. The essential fact is that there was a shortage, and the Germans knew it. What they could not understand was that the British

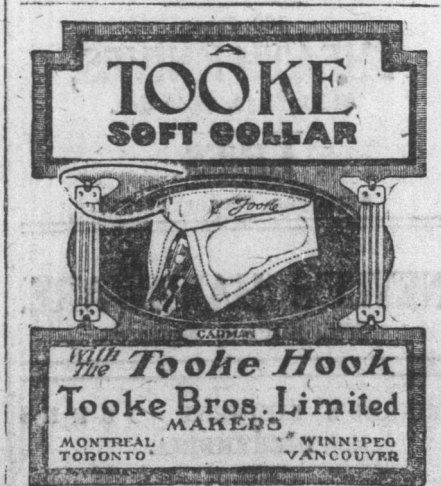


Army, improvised in as many weeks as their own had taken years to create, could, without loss of morale, face artillery and high explosives to which it could not reply. The courage and devotion of British officers and men in such circumstances needs no finer testimony. That apart, what concerns every citizen of the British Empire is that both Lord French and Admiral Jellicoe have now shown how narrow was the margin by which irreparable disaster was averted. The Fleet was not the preponderant force and if the Old Contemptibles saved the situation at Mons, the Territorials and the earliest recruits of Kitchener's army achieved not less notable triumphs. British morale was behind it all, and German "victories" were in consequence indistinguishable from defeats. A German authority recently claimed that Germany won 500 victories; doubtless he is still wondering why Germany lost the War.—United Empire.

Mad Monarchs.

Anyone who remembers the unfortunate history of the House of Wittelsbach will not be surprised at the news that Ludwig III, ex-King of Bavaria, is showing symptoms of insanity.

King Ludwig II, who came to the throne in 1864 at the age of eighteen, was a dreamer with a passion for music and for building palaces. He was the patron of Wagner, and one of his forms of eccentricity was to order performances of Wagner's operas at which His Majesty was the entire audience. His idiosyncrasies became so marked that in June, 1886, Prince Luitpold was appointed Regent. A week later the King committed suicide in Starnberg Lake, and his body physician, Dr. Gladden, was drowned in a vain attempt to save the life of his royal charge.

Ludwig's brother Otto then became King of Bavaria. He, too, was afflicted with the family curse, and within a few weeks of his accession had to resign his functions into the hands of Prince Luitpold, who became Regent. He in his turn was succeeded by his son Ludwig, who eventually became King, and is the man upon whom the curse of the Wittelsbachs has now apparently fallen. His son, Prince Rupprecht, commanded the Bavarian Army during the war.
