The assertion self is the worst encouragement at can be given to the fishermen er attempting that Utopian goal, hich every supplier hopes for, as dently as does every economist or ver of his fellows. Supplying is a ad plan, and especially bad in our res in the north. The failures and ses made by the small as well as large supplying merchants these two years is freefutable proof at least in the particular circumces of our coast, the system constant anxiety, risk and riodio disasters. As a stimulus to aracter development it has none of advantages of straight cash deal-. Its tendency is to force poor en into crooked dealings and sup-jers into charging prices that will wer the bad debts at the expense of better dealers. We have tried for operation. That unquestionably is best system in theory. It is alws a better way in everything than the straight competitive waying nearer to God's way. But it dends on men having the Co-operae Spirit, and loses that stimulant ompetition, which helps like a ip helps. Co-operation as evidenced the experiments of others than self clearly show this. In this intry many of the smaller co-operastores of the Co-operative Fishen's Union have met disaster m the failure of the local human ent. It certainly is a less expenmethod of production. next winter. He has four children. He bought a horse with the last of his savings last fall thinking with it he could make pit-propping pay. He used it all winter, and could not make it pay more that the oats it ate. A fortnight ago he lost it. It wandered away one day and has not been seen since. This man is a clever model boat builder. Another man just taken in as a patient is only twenty years old, he is clean, bright, handsome, but starved down to skin and bones. He is one of a family of fourteen, and all are living on a very close diet, consisting of only dry bread and tea to-day. We are suspicious of tuberculosis already setting in his lungs.

MORE IMPORTANT THAN EDUCA-THON.

Nutrition is more important here than education. We have a dozen specialists to teach nutrition at various stations this summer in the North. How to cook a potato? What are the cheapest foods? How to make the most in fats, proteids, carbohydrates and vitamines, of things within our reach are far more important just now than how to read and write, or even sing and pray. Starvation is not only threatening but overtaking many of our brothers and sisters. Of this I shall write more in detail later, as the good ship and dearly beloved Prospero and her fine crew are close at hand to carry this letter to the south. Here is one good example of the nutritional teaching. Family of seven. Father and eldest son paralyzed with beri-beri. Mother a bag of skin and bones. Eldest girl weak and anaemic. The three youngest children all as fatas butter. It was a puzzle to me, as the little ones generally suffer most. "How do you cook your potatoes?" asked the mother.

"Peel them." "What do you do with the peel-

ings?" "I mostly throw them out to the hens, but the little ones eat some." Enquiry showed that the little children had acquired the habit, driven by hunger, of chasing up those discarded potato peels and eating them raw. Thereby they had gotten exactly the needed vitamines, and were safe from beri-beri so far. In another family we found one big boy outstandingly fat. He shyly admitted that he loved raw potatoes, and ate the washed peelings' "mostly a bit every day." Yet the universal custom on this coast is to cleave exclusively to white flour and boiled, peeled potatoes.


