impulsive character, and was said to carry a weapon concealed about her, thus she was not a person to be treated lightly. Lord Forrester, when intoxicated, had on occasion spoken of her opprobriously, and this fact came to her knowledge. Inspired with fury, she repaired at once to the castle of Conestown, and finding that he was drinking at a tavern in the village she sent for him and they met in a garden. A violent altercation ensued between them, and in the midst of it she snatched his sword, from his side ran him through the body and killed him on the spot. After the murder she took refuge in a garret of the Castle, but she was discovered there one of her slippers having dropped through a crevice of the floor. Being seized and brought before the Sheriff of Edinburgh, she made a confession of her crime, but said that Lord Forrester was intoxicated and furious, that he ran at her with his sword, which she took from him to protect herself and he fell upon it. She practiced a deception upon the Court by which her sentence of death was postponed for two months, during which, notwithstanding the care of her enjoiner on John Wens, Gude-man of the Tolbooth, she escaped in male attire, but was captured by the Ruthvens next day at Pala Mill. On November 12, before being beheaded at the Market Cross, she appeared on the scaffold in deep mourning, laid aside a large veil and bared her neck and shoulders, to the executioner with the utmost courage.

Japan to Encourage Pine Importation.

The Japanese government has decided to encourage the importation of American pine with a view to regulating the market quotations of timber in general. There has been such a steady increase in the importation of American pine that some timber dealers here regard it as a menace to the domestic forestry enterprise and an attempt by the imperial government to keep the influx of the timber in check, is advocated.

Mr. Nakai, chief of the forestry affairs bureau in the department of agriculture and commerce, however, belittled the suggestion while admitting the growing increase of the import from the U.S. "It is true," he stated, "that during the past few years the import of American pine has been more than doubled chiefly because of its lower quotations. But the imported timber is so inferior in quality that its growing import can hardly menace the domestic forestry undertakings."

Instead of checking the import of American pine, therefore, according to Mr. Nakai, the government will rather encourage it, in the hope of utilizing it for the purpose of regulating the domestic market quotations of general timber.

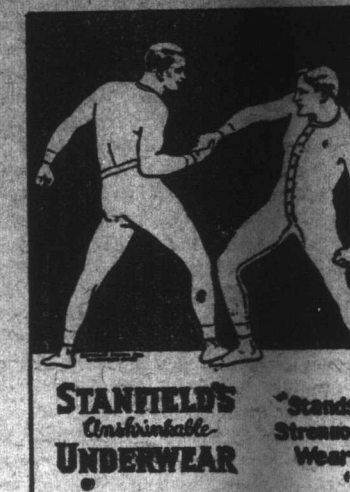

PIPE SUBSTITUTE.

A cheap bituminous clay pipe, to be used in the place of cast iron pipe, has been devised by the Carnegie Institute of Technology. The new form of piping, it is expected, will be as satisfactory for drainage and sewerage purposes as the more expensive cast iron pipe which has been the only variety available up to the present.

The chief difficulty in the search for a substitute for cast iron pipe has been to find a method of joining the ends of the substitute piping without leakage. Various bituminous cements were recommended for this purpose, but early experiments showed that

they were unable to overcome the difficulty. An entirely new technique in the use of these cements has now been devised. Four important points have been established: 1—The joint in the pipe can be effectively accomplished by the use of a proper compound. 2—The joints in this manner will withstand any strain that the pipe itself will stand. 3—A pipe line joined in this manner can be thrown out of alignment without causing leakage at the joints. 4—Leads due to poor workmanship can be prepared easily and quickly. Industrial Digest.
