ceeds for your own gain you become
a thief yourself, or at best the judge
in your own cause. This excuse, so
often heard, should be condemned by
every hearer. It seems impossible for
a worker to do anything if his tools
are inadequate or wanting. However
honest he may be, he cannot earn an
honest and decent wage in compe-
tition with modern competition if the
capitalist cannot or will not supply
him with the proper tools and ap-
pliances. Articles have been made in
this country in which each worker has
labored as hard as two men, and yet
the goods could not compete with the
product of foreign machines. The
tinmiths, as I pointed out, pay only
20 per cent. on their sheet tin and
solder and the imported finished ar-
ticle pays a duty of 70 per cent. Yet
the foreign article is driving the local
producer out of the market. The rem-
