Our Montreal Letter

(From Our Own Correspondent.)
ST. MARY'S HOSPITAL IS NOW A GOING CONCERN.

The dream of a lifetime has at last been accomplished. It is the establishment of an English-speaking Catholic Hospital to be known as St. Mary's. It is situated at 905 Dorchester Street West, formerly the home of the late Baron Shaughnessy. It starts with a modest beginning with a promise of a greater institution in the future. It is an indication that the English-speaking Catholics of Montreal to the number of 60,000 have accepted their responsibility to do a share of the work in caring for the sick and injured of one of the largest cities on the Continent. It requires courage and perseverance to establish it, but those behind the movement have at last succeeded. Those who will guide its destinies are possessed of willing hands, willing hearts, the spirit of sacrifice, and a great desire to help the cause of suffering humanity by striving to cure or alleviate the bodily ills to which mankind is heir to, but to afford comfort, peace and happiness to the soul also, thus following in the Master's footsteps.

"They minister to the sick and needy, With delight, and always cheerful and gay. Those true devoted daughters of Jean Mance, Lifting the sorrows from day to day."

The new hospital is incorporated by an Act of the Legislature of Quebec. "It maintains and manages a general hospital under Catholic control to receive and treat sick and injured persons without distinction as to race and creed."

The English-speaking Catholics treated in Montreal hospitals for the past five years were 18,630. In the Royal Victoria alone last year 1,425 English-speaking Catholics were treated. In the General 1,566 and in the Western. On the five year basis the average number per month totals 321.

The present capacity of St. Mary's hospital is 44 beds, with a modern operating room, and a complete laboratory. It will be a training school for Nurses. The hospital is in charge of "The Hospitaliers of St. Joseph," or commonly called, "The Sisters of the Hotel Dieu."

In Montreal, at present, there is a shortage of over 1,000 beds in the hospitals.

A drive for funds for the new hospital will take place on November 3rd and finish November 17th. I am informed by Frank J. Jackman, a former Newfoundlander, and the well-known Boys' Clothing Specialist, who is also a Governor of the Institution, and Vice-President of the Board of Directors, that nearly \$100,000 of the objective, \$150,000, has been subscribed, and the campaign will not start before two weeks.

There are 83 names on the list of Governors, which means \$1,000 each. On the list I find the names of 20 medical men, several of the Irish clergy, and also the name of his Grace Archbishop George Gauthier. There is probably no more indefatigable worker in the cause of the new institution than my friend, Frank J. Jackman. He has enrolled a large number of subscribers and governors, which means thousands of dollars to the Hospital. The following are the Patrons and the Board of Directors:

TEN THOUSAND OUT OF EMPLOYMENT.

According to the estimate given by John T. Foster, President of the Trades and Labor Council, there are ten thousand unemployed on the island of Montreal. A delegation waited on Mayor Duquette to try and get the City Council to have certain extensive public works started and kept going during the winter months to relieve the situation which is daily growing worse.

FINE NEW CHURCH IN MONTREAL WEST.

The new Presbyterian Church at Montreal West is one of the largest and finest of its kind in the Montreal District. It will soon be completed, and the cost of the structure is to be \$80,000. Two wings will be devoted to Sunday School work and space will be available for meetings of all kinds. The building is 90 feet in height, while the windows will be in Cathedral style.

NOT ENCOURAGING HOME INDUSTRY.

The Montreal Trades and Labor Council is up in arms concerning the use of advertising matter printed in other countries being used to advertise "Made in Canada" goods. The average Canadian print shop

is only working two and a half to three days a week, while the majority of the shops across the border are working full time, it was stated at the meeting. The proposition put before the council, that the workers boycott firms using foreign-printed advertising matter, met with the hearty approval of the assembly.

OUR RAILWAYS ARE SHOWING BIG DEFICITS.

Canadian Pacific Railway traffic earnings for the week ending October 14th, 1924, were \$4,214,000, as compared with \$5,193,000 in the corresponding week of last year, being a decrease of \$979,000.

The Canadian National Railways up to the end of October show a deficit of over ten million dollars compared with last year. The result is, that both companies are reducing their office staffs.

E. H. Beatty, President of the C.P.R., speaking at a gathering in Boston, said that the railway situation in Canada was fast becoming a grave one, and that something would have to be done to relieve the increasing trouble.

The Montreal Herald, under the heading of "Must the C.P.R. be nationalized," says: "That Canada will shortly have to face another most serious railway problem is evident from the speech made in Boston this week by Mr. E. W. Beatty, president of the C.P.R. We believe it will be no injustice to him to infer from his speech that in his opinion the present situation cannot continue and that either the Canadian National Railways will have to be put on a basis of private ownership, or the Canadian Pacific system will have to be taken over by the government."

Looking at the matter from an entirely unbiased point of view, it would appear obvious that no private system of railways can continue to be milked by the government while a public system is being fed by it. In other words the government cannot continue to force the C.P.R. to pay enormous income and other taxes, while subsidizing the Canadian National to run in competition with it on a tax-free basis. Mr. Beatty put the absurdity of the situation squarely when he said: "The Canadian Pacific is the largest taxpayer in Canada. Therefore, the greater the deficit the National Railways, the heavier the taxes of the Canadian Pacific; whereas if the National Railways are successful by reason of the diversion of traffic from the privately owned system, the loss in revenue to the latter is greater than that represented by increased taxation. Again, the greater the revenue of the Canadian Pacific, the greater its contribution to the exchequer of the rival system will be. A more delightfully incongruous situation it is hardly possible to imagine."

Just think of any company in another line of business having to compete with a Government organization not only exempted from taxation but able, if it does business at a loss, to hand that loss on to another exchequer, i.e., to the taxpayers. The absurdity of the situation is manifest. Yet that is the situation in which the C.P.R. finds itself. If the C.N.R. has a deficit, the C.P.R., as the biggest taxpayer, must pay a large proportion of that deficit. On the other hand, the more business the C.P.R. does, the heavier the tax levied on it.

Mr. Beatty shows that it is only a question of years before the problem must be faced and a decision arrived at. The late Lord Shaughnessy foresaw this very climax when nationalization was first mooted. He made a proposition whereby the C.P.R. might be taken over. His proposal was rejected, but that only delayed the solution. The problem remains.

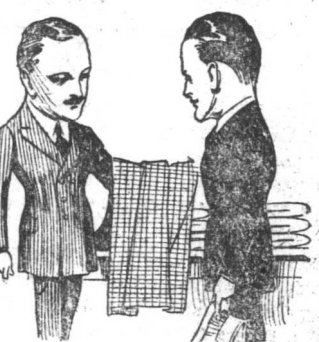

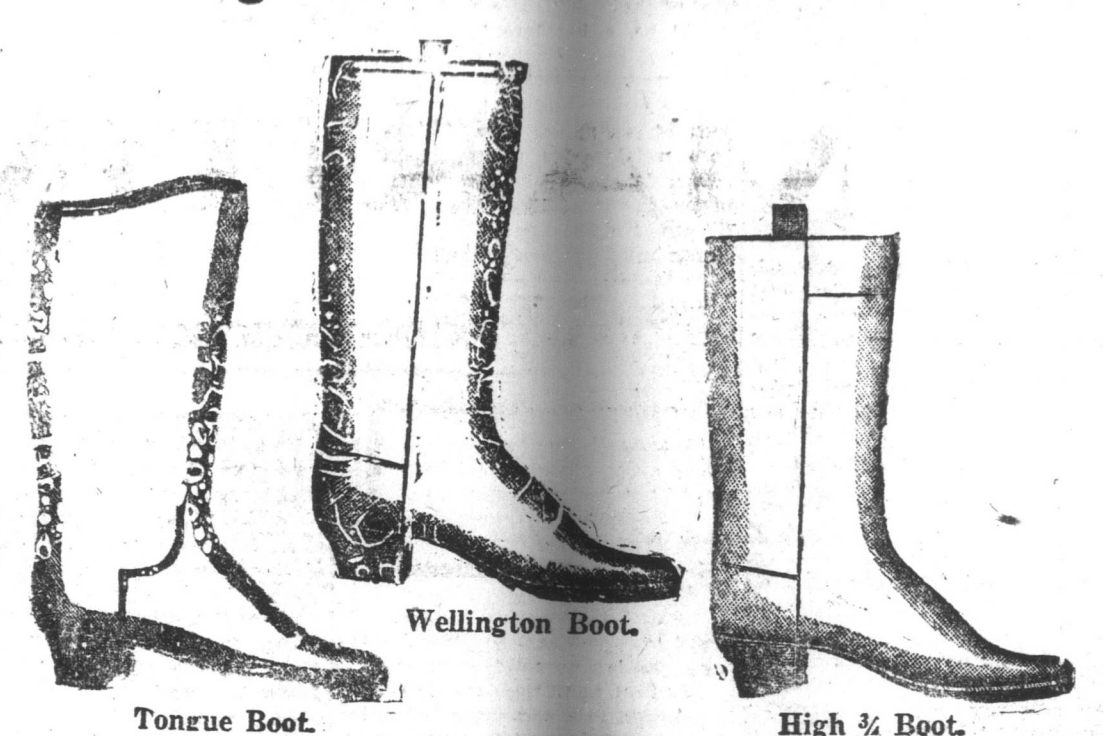
