

St. Patrick's Day.—St. Patrick's Day was celebrated with more than usual display by Irish citizens in N. Y. and Brooklyn, Jersey City, Newark and other neighbouring localities. In New York the procession consisted of upwards of 40,000 men, containing 35 bands and was two hours passing the City Hall, where it was received by Mayor Hall. In Toronto the St. Patrick and other Hibernian Societies walked in procession to the number of 100, with five bands. In Montreal there was also a large procession. In Ottawa there were services in the churches, and a procession at noon numbering 1,500. In Hamilton a concert was given under the auspices of the Irish Protestant Benevolent Society, which was most successful.

A new road from Red River to the Lake of the Woods is to be commenced in April by the Dominion Government.

Ordinance lands in Ottawa have been sold to the amount of \$20,000 on ten years' credit.

Mr. Frederick Ritchie has been appointed postmaster of Hamilton.
