their great aim had been to exclude any foreign element, and place it in the hands of the Canadians, acting in the interest of Canada. In the Committee room he had urged an adjournment, simply as an act of justice to Mr. Abbott and Sir Hugh Allan. He went so far as to declare these gentlemen were the only witnesses who could prove the innocence of the Government. He affected to be greatly shocked that Sir Francis Hincks, one of the accused, should have been summoned as the first witness. After other allusions, he concluded with a truculent air of indifference to the charge, alternated with almost whining appeals for justice, interspersed occasionally with language closely bordering on irreverence. Mr. Mackenzie rebuked with much severity the gross personal assaults of the Premier on Mr. Huntington, and amid warm cheers paid a tribute to the high personal and public character of thathon, gentleman. He then sketshed the history of the proceedings from the time Mr. Huntington moved his resolution to the present time, and exposed the policy of delay and postponement which had been pursued by the Administration. If the Government were so innocent, he asked, why were they so angry at the charge, and why so fearful of being put to the proof? He pointed out how extraordinary a preference, to the exclusion of all other competition, had been shown to Sir Hugh Allan, leading, as it had done, coupled with a lavish expenditure of public money during the elections to a wide-spread feeling of suspicion that some improper arrangement had been made on the basis of the granting of the Pacific Railway Charter. He recalled to mind the boast of Mr. William McDougall that the Intercolonial Railway would secure to the Government a ten years? lease of power. That corrupt declaration had never been repudiated by any member of the Administration, and it was quite in keeping with that proceeding that the Pacific Railway should always be used as a means of securing or retaining power.
