London, May 7, 5:30 a. m.—Viscount Chelsea, the Conservative candidate, has been elected to Parliament, from Bath, to fill the seat made vacant by the death of Sir William Tite. (dw)

Kingston, N. Y., May 7.—The great break on the Walkill Valley Railway at Rosendale, has been repaired and trains will cross to-day. (dw)
