

MEDICINE HAT VOTES ADDITIONAL BYLAWS FOR INDUSTRIES

Means the Expenditure of \$31,000,000 and the Employment of a Large Force of Men—Bylaws Voted for \$1,000,000 for Public Improvements.

ONE CONCERN WILL MAKE RAILROAD ACCESSORIES

Another Will Manufacture Radiator, While the Third Concern Is a Bridge Concern and the Fourth is the Canada Cement Company.

Medicine Hat, Alberta, May 19.—What was probably the most important reference of by-laws to the burgesses, took place Thursday, when by overwhelming majorities four industrial and nine municipal by-laws, when the plants and equipment are completed, will mean the addition to the city of between 800 and 1,000 workers, besides their families, and will entail the expenditure of more than \$3,000,000 in construction and equipment. The by-laws will require an expenditure of about \$1,000,000, and give much needed additional water, sewer, and gas extensions, together with better streets and increased fire protection.

The vote on each one of these by-laws was the largest that has yet been polled for such measures in this city, and aggregated 500 ballots. Of this number, the votes against were comparatively few and scattered.

Of the industrial by-laws one of the largest and most important was that of granting concessions to the Great West Iron, Wood, and Chemical company, represented by Felix Frank, K.C., H. C. Grant and Hector McInnes. This concern agrees to spend approximately \$1,000,000 in the erection and equipment of a plant for the manufacture of car wheels, steel underframes, box cars, flat cars, engineering accessories, and promises to become one of the most important industries in Alberta. Mr. Frank has stated that no time will be lost in getting his engineers to work and in starting his extensive construction program. This industry will employ upwards of 300 hands at the start.

Will Make Radiators.
The concessions which were voted to L. Carey Wright of Sault Ste. Marie, Minnesota, were for the institution here of a radiator manufacturing concern to be known as the Medicine Hat Radiator company. Local capital will also be interested in this concern, and an investment of upwards of \$100,000 will be made, employing about 50 hands at the outset. These two industries will be located on what is known as the South Industrial site, and the rails necessary to connect the site with the C.P.R. have already been purchased and part of them have arrived. These are required in order that the construction material can be placed on the ground at the earliest moment.

A third industry on which the vote was favorable was that of the concessions to the Saskatchewan Bridge and Iron company, which will be erected on the West Industrial site, and will entail an initial investment of \$150,000 and employ about 150 hands. The work of grading the spur to this site is now in progress.

The fourth industry, which carried by a large majority as well as far as the concessions were concerned, was that of the Canada Cement company, the great plant of which, to manufacture 4,000 barrels of cement daily, is to be constructed by the Hunt Engineering company. This also will be an industry of vast importance to Medicine Hat and will employ an army of workers, not only in the construction thereof, but in the operation of the plant itself.

IMPROVEMENT BYLAWS.

Nine other by-laws were endorsed by the burgesses as follows: For water extensions, \$225,000; electric light, \$117,000; additional fire apparatus, \$17,000; grading streets, \$87,000; trunk sewers, \$118,000; fire halls and equipment, \$67,000; board of trade, \$15,000; natural gas extensions, \$223,000; extension and improvement of water plant, \$55,000.

Today the mayor and councilmen expressed themselves as being not a little pleased that the citizens should have endorsed their judgment in arranging for these heavy expenditures. The location of three of the above-named industries means the opening up and the building of spur tracks to the same. In view of the fact that the present industrial section has little room for more industries, this phase is also important because it brings trackage without delay to the new sites where new factories now negotiating with the city may be satisfactorily located on short notice.

WINNIPEG WATER RATES ADVANCED 10 PER CENT.

Winnipeg, May 19.—A ten per cent. increase in all water rates in Winnipeg will be ordered by the city council within the next week or two, and will take effect at the beginning of the next quarter. Increased costs in operation, including wages and maintenance and the absolute necessity of providing more money for the sinking fund in connection with the water department are cited as the cause for the increase. This increase would add about \$50,000 to the revenue of the department yearly.

OTTAWA'S HORSE SHOW CLASSES

Ottawa, Ont., May 19.—Ottawa's fourth annual horse show closed Saturday night after a most successful week. Championship classes brought a great crowd for the performances. Jack Hamilton, Hon. C. Sifton's jockey, had a narrow escape when putting confidence over the high jump, the animal falling and rolling on the rider. Hamilton, although badly shaken up and bruised, was able to continue and rode another of Mr. Sifton's string, Hercules, to victory in the class.

CAPTAIN AMUNDSEN BARNES' GREAT CIRCUS REACHES CALGARY FRIDAY HERE TWO DAYS NEXT WEEK

Will Tell of the Discovery of the South Pole in the Sherman Rink on Friday Evening

Captain Roald Amundsen will arrive in Calgary on Friday morning from the far north, which is Edmonton. For the present occasion he is not bent on exploration, but on Friday evening he will tell the thousands of Calgary people who will attend in the Sherman Rink what it feels like to visit the South Pole in the height of summer, which is our winter and which is winter indeed there. The early morning will bring the discovery of the South Pole into Calgary and will spend the day in seeing the sights. He has been invited by various clubs to address of their hospitality, these including the University Club, the Canadian Club and the Professional Club. To the present none of the invitations have been accepted and it is expected that the brave captain will require some rest in the midst of the strenuous tour in which he is engaged, telling the story of the finding of the Pole.

The lecture which will be illustrated by some of the most wonderful pictures ever seen in Calgary, will commence at 8:30. It is expected that James W. Davidson of Calgary, the well known citizen who too has visited the ice floes and the snow fields, will preside and introduce the famous lecturer. Some of the pictures are taken by the cinematograph and as previous explorers have never taken such pictures, these will prove most interesting and entertaining. The lecture, coming from the lips of the man who was the first to reach the southern extremity of the earth, and whose records were found by the ill-fated victims, his English rival Scott and companions, will be one of the greatest of the year in Calgary and few may afford to miss it.

The lecture is under the auspices of the Norwegian Young People's Society. Samhold and Scandinavians will be present in full force.

Eggs Are Invaluable Aid to Sufferers From Nervous Exhaustion.

London, May 19.—In an article on the "Easter Eggs in Modern Terms" the Lancet has some observations upon the substance known as "lecithin" which should be of the greatest interest to sufferers from nervous exhaustion.

The injunction in medieval times that after a period of partial abstention from food during the Lenten season the egg should form a prominent article of diet on Easter day proves to be a peculiarly sensible one in the light of modern knowledge in regard to its composition.

"Some authorities," says the Lancet, "have gone so far as to assert that the nerve centres depend on lecithin for the highest performance of their functions, and that nerve and brain exhaustion is caused by an undue expenditure of lecithin. Lecithin has thus been employed in nervous breakdown of various forms and the experience is recorded that after a short course of treatment by lecithin the sufferers put on flesh and experience a feeling of well being."

In the treatment of nervous disorders the dose of lecithin is from three to five grains three times a day, half an hour before meals, so that the daily maximum intake of prepared lecithin would be fifteen grains, which is just a grain short of the lecithin found in a single egg. The supply, therefore, it is obvious, can easily be kept up by the simple custom of taking an average sized egg at the main meal.

The reverence for an egg in religious history was no doubt based upon its life potentialities.

WAS ROBBED AS HE KNELT BESIDE THE BIER

Crime Perpetrated on New York Cloakmaker Was of the Most Despicable Class

New York, May 19.—Abe Enzweig, a cloakmaker, of 88 Cannon street, called at the home of a cousin who died last Sunday to pay his last respects and attend the funeral. The little apartment on the third floor at 1 to 3 Attorney street, the home of his relative, was crowded with mourners.

As Enzweig knelt at the side of the coffin he was joined by a newcomer who had just entered the room. Heads were all bowed and no one noticed that the man was not a mourner. Enzweig started to get up he felt the hand of the man next to him in his trousers pocket. He grappled with him and the man dropped 92 cents belonging to Enzweig on the floor and made for the door.

Enzweig picked up the money and ran after the thief, followed by other mourners. In the scramble down the stairs one of the leaders fell, causing many who took up the chase to tumble

over him. Once on the street the thief soon left the chasers far behind, but a policeman stopped him.

When the crowd caught up the fugitive was explaining that some one had stolen \$2 from him, but the policeman believed Enzweig's story and took the man to the station house.

In the Essex market court yesterday Magistrate Appleton held the prisoner, who said he was Max Twersky, 35 years old, for the grand jury and fixed bail at \$5,000. When Enzweig plainly showed that he was not anxious to press the charge the magistrate said he thought an attempt had been made to frighten him from appearing against the prisoner.

POWDER POPPED IN HIS PIPE

An After-Dinner Smoke Blew Man Up and Sent Him to Hospital

Kansas City, May 19.—Jack Hedstrom is employed in a construction camp north of the city. He tired of "camp chuck" and came here yesterday to get a square meal. After the dinner his first thought was of his pipe. He sat down on the curbing near Missouri avenue and Main street, and produced a handful of tobacco from his pocket.

He forgot that he had carried blasting powder in the same pocket. When the smoke cleared away Hedstrom was suffering from severe burns on his right hand and face. He was taken to the Emergency hospital, where Dr. Abraham Weinberg dressed his burns. They are not serious.

REMARKABLE TRIBUTE TO THE MEMORY OF RAILROAD MAN

Prominent Railroad Men from All Over the United States and Canada Attend

Montreal, May 19.—A remarkable tribute to the memory of a much esteemed and widely known railway official was shown by the attendance of railway men and prominent citizens at the funeral on Saturday of the late W. E. Davis, passenger traffic manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway system.

Probably never before in the history of Montreal, excepting at the funeral of Mr. Davis' late chief, President C. M. Hays, has there been such a gathering of representatives of Canadian and United States railways, and the funeral was one of the largest and most impressive ever seen in the city.

At 7:30 a.m. a special train left Bonaventure station with a large party of railway officials and other friends of Mr. Davis on board. On arrival at Ste. Anne de Bellevue, motors and

carriages were in waiting to convey the members of the party to the beautiful residence where Mr. Davis had erected with a view to spending in it the evening of his life as he was looking forward to his retirement from active service. Here the impressive service of the Anglican church was conducted by Rev. C. Lancaster, rector of the parish.

Mr. Davis' personal friendship with leading clergymen of differing creeds. After the service, the funeral procession was formed, and proceeded to the depot at Ste. Anne, where the funeral train was in waiting.

The casket was placed in the motor car "Musoka," the motor car of the American Presbyterian church, Montreal, the association of these three at the service being evidence of the wide range of Mr. Davis' personal friendship with leading clergymen of differing creeds.

Meanwhile an even larger party had gathered at the Bonaventure station here.

There were no official pallbearers, the casket being carried by members of the undertakers' staff. All those who were bared as the casket was carried through the streets to the railway station, the motor car "Musoka," the motor car of the American Presbyterian church, Montreal, the association of these three at the service being evidence of the wide range of Mr. Davis' personal friendship with leading clergymen of differing creeds.

While the funeral was in progress, all flags on the Grand Trunk system, from the Atlantic to the Pacific, were flown at half mast, and the city offices in Montreal, Ottawa, Quebec and other cities were closed for an hour.
