Medicine Hat, Alberta, May 19.—
What was probably the most important reference of by-laws to the burgesses, took place when by overwhelming four industrial and nine municipal works bylaws were voted on favorably in Medicine Hat. The industrial blass when the plants and equipworks. Bylaws when the plants and equipment are completed, will mean the addition to the city of between 800 and 1,000 workers, besides their families, and will entail the expenditure of more than \$3,000,000 in construction and equipment. The municipal by-laws will require an expenditure of about \$1,000,000, and give much be additional water, sewer, and gas extensions, together with better streets and increased fire protection.

The vote on each one of these by-laws was the largest that has yet been polled for such measures in this city, and aggregated about 500 ballots. Of this number, the votes against were comparatively few and scattered. omparatively few and scattered.

Of the industrial by-laws one of the largest and most important was that of granting concessions to the Great West Iron, Wood, and Chemical company, represented by Felix Frank, D. B. Hanna, Hon. F. H. Phippen, K.C., H. C. Grant and Hector McInnes. This concern agrees to spend approximately \$1,000,000 in the erection and equip-ment of a plant for the manufacture of car wheels, steel underframes, box cars, flat cars, and engineering accessories and promises to become one of cars, that cars, and engineering one of the most important industries in Alberta. Improvement Bylaws.

Nine other by-laws were endorsed by the burgesses as follows: For water extensions, \$225,000; electric light, \$117,000 additional fire apparatus, \$17-000; grading streets, \$67,000; trunk sewers, \$116,000; fire halls and equipment, \$67,000; board of trade, \$15,000; natural gas extensions, \$223,000; extension and improvement of water plant. and improvement of water plant,
